II. Agenda Topics

- Advise the SEA of unmet needs within the State in the education of children with disabilities
 - Sped Updates (assessment, accommodations, RDA, SSIP): SEP Staff
 - Ben Morrison - updated panel on how the two Statewide Alternate Assessments went.
 - DSTEP-A – assesses Science, NCSC = National Center and State Collaborative – assesses Math and ELA (reading and writing)
 - Hot topic issue with many states is the possibility of more students taking the Alternate Assessment because the Smarter Balanced Assessment is so difficult.
 - Big issue with the assessment was multiple vendors – Questar is the vendor for DSTEP-A, Measured Progress is the vendor for NCSC – confused many people because we have had Pearson for DSTEP-A for so many years.
 - Beth Schiltz – update panel on Accommodations during Statewide Assessment.
 - Allowed read-aloud of passages for Smarter Balance
 - Expecting 2% of students to use this accommodation
 - 30% to 40% ended up using this accommodation
 - Melissa Flor – SSIP –
 - our SIMR (State – Identified Measurable Result) is students with specific learning disabilities will increase reading proficiency prior to fourth grade from 33.16% to 41.83% by 2018 as measured by the statewide assessment
 - Data Analysis: What data analysis processes surrounding students with specific learning disabilities do you use/will you use among staff members at the K-3 grade level?
 - Marie Ivers and Erin Schons volunteered to be a part of the SSIP stakeholders group
 - Moving towards a results driven accountability.
 - Having 1st stakeholders meeting on July 21st to get a better perspective on how to handle the data
 - Shelly Shaw volunteered to be on the stakeholder group – DOE was looking for more representation from West River
 - Next year there will be a team to over-see
 - McKinney Veto, Laura Johnson-Frame
 - McKinney-Vento Education of Homeless Children and Youth Act = HUD Act – Subtitle VII-B of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act; reauthorized as Title X, Part C of ESEA 2001 (NCLB)
 - Homeless students have the same rights as any other student
 - Main causes of homelessness
 - lack of affordable housing
 - youth without physical custody by a parent or guardian
 - of the 150 public school districts, 53 identified homeless students– over 2,100 students with a majority in Sioux Falls and Rapid City – both districts have staff who work to identify and provide services to eligible students – many more go unidentified
 - Each district and BIE schools must appoint an employee to be a liaison
 - Who qualifies – Children or youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. Including sharing the housing of others due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason, living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, camping ground due to lack of adequate alternative accommodations, living in emergency or transitional shelters, awaiting foster care placement, living in a public or private palace not designed for humans to live, living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus, or train stations, or a similar setting, migratory children living in the above circumstances, unaccompanied youth living in the above circumstances

2. Comment publicly on any rules or regulations proposed by the state regarding the education of children with disabilities

- Restraints and Seclusion, Linda Turner
 - Had a workgroup meeting last week.
 - South Dakota is only 1 of 2 states that doesn't have a law regarding this.
 - Questions regarding what kind of restraints will be included – chemical, physical, mechanical.
 - Will there be a universal form of non-physical training that is required (CPI for example)

3. Advise the SEA in developing and implementing policies relating to the coordination of services for children with disabilities

- SD Advocacy, Tim Neyhart
 - Tim is 2nd direct of SD Advocacy in the history of the organization
 - 12 people work for SD Advocacy.
 - SD Advocacy has not had an increase in funding for 13 years.
 - Most of the caseload coming through the agency are regarding special education students
 - Part of their grant is to reach out to all areas within the state. By doing that, they have been able to identify standard issues within the state of South Dakota
 - Last 3-5 years the biggest issues have been in the area of students that are expelled, suspended, disregarded from school. Transition is also a large portion of their industry.
 - Cases involving Development Disabilities are also a large part of their caseload, varies between transition issues to all other types.
 - Last year's most common issues were ESY (Extended School Year)
 - Advocacy has been very involved in Juvenile Detention Facilities, wanting to make sure that the students are receiving services
 - Tim shared a success story about Juvenile Justice, shared it because they are going to continue that effort and SD Advocacy has been recognized nationally for their efforts.
 - SD Advocacy is active in multiple functions; Lighting the Way, Transition Institute, and YLF (Youth Leadership Forum).
 - They are going to monitor sheltered workshops as part of the Workforce Initiative Act.
 - Invited to work in the Seclusion and Restraints workgroup with Special Education Programs
 - This workgroup is recommending that this rule should apply to ALL students not just Special Education students.
- Life Span Folders, Dan Lusk
 - Mr. Lusk gave a background of what he does and the people he provides services for.
 - Supporting Real Lives Across The Lifespan
 - Looking for places to disseminate information about Life Span– Birth to Three, Headstart, Special Ed teachers, case managers, and pediatricians.
 - Incorporating employment content and information, strengthening message and value of work, change culture and expectation of employment.
 - Families asking for reliable information throughout the lifespan, understanding those needs change along with major life changes, transitions through life, incorporating employment content in materials, Life Span folder=resources.
 - Charting the life course booklet – “plot a course”, starting point no matter where you are in life journey, information was developed by families, self-advocates for families, and self-advocates, guide represents things they thought about, asked or wished they would have.
 - Have printed 10,000 folders, goal is to get the information out.
- DD Council, Arlene Poncelet
 - Mission Statement : To assist people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families in achieving the quality of life they desire through advocacy, system change, and capacity building.
 - Focus on Inclusion: Council activities focus on the Inclusion of people with disabilities in their communities – where they live, learn, work, worship, volunteer and participate in leisure activities.

- Arlene is the only staff person on the DD Council
- She helps students and families attend workshops, other than doing grant work.
- Council is getting ready to write a new 5-year plan.
- Need stakeholder input.
- Want to work with other councils to see if there is an opportunity to work collaboratively.
- Augie Access – program for students with DD to attend college on Augustana campus.
 - All of the students that apply, will be paid through Vocational Rehabilitation, with employment as the desired outcome.
 - Hoping to become a certified program so that it would be funded through grants and other funds
- Another project is recruiting a middle school to promote for self-advocacy
 - Received only one bid on the RFP and it was Center for Disabilities that it was awarded to – they will work with West Central and Hartford
- DD Council is having a meeting on July 14th, they are going around and meeting with other panels/groups and would like those groups to send a couple members to the meeting on July 14th.
