Attached for the Transportation Commission's consideration is a speed limit administrative rule change on State Trunk Highway 115 through Dell Rapids, South Dakota.

The South Dakota Department of Transportation.


SPEED STUDY:

PURPOSE OF THE CHANGES:

The purpose of the change is to adjust the speed limits to due to changes in roadway geometrics from the reconstruction project.

WHY THE CHANGES ARE RECOMMENDED:


Construction is taking place in Brookings on US Highway 14 and the roadway geometrics are changing with the project. US Highway 14 (6th Street) in Brookings from just east of 22^{nd} Ave. is currently a divided section with a depressed median and 10 Ft. outside shoulders, which then tapers back to a 2 lane road east of 32^{nd} Ave. The new roadway through this same stretch will have curb and gutter on both sides with a raised center median. The existing roadway is what a typical rural section would look like and the new roadway has the geometrics of an urban highway. 35 mph is typical of an urban highway and would match the speed limit to the west to 22^{nd} Ave. A transition speed of 50 mph would be posted between the 35 mph zone and the 65 mph speed limit to the east heading out of town.

Currently, just east of the northbound ramps on the interchange the speed limit changes to 45 mph and then to 55 mph just east of 34th Avenue. Due to roadway changes it is expected that the 85th percentile speed will decrease through this section east of the interchange.



70:01:02:44. Lincoln County. The following are the maximum speeds on certain highways in Lincoln County:

(11) U.S. Highway 18 and the Lincoln County road over Interstate Highway 29 at Exit 62 beginning at a point $\frac{0.25}{0.17}$ mile west of the centerline of Interstate Highway 29, then east $\frac{0.5}{0.53}$ mile, 40 55 miles per hour;

PURPOSE OF THE CHANGES:

Adjust the administrative rule to reflect the change in speed limit as warranted with the reconstruction project.

WHY THE CHANGES ARE RECOMMENDED:

The reconstruction of the Interstate Highway 29 Interchange at Exit 62 allowed for adjustment of the speed limit to accomplish the intended safety and function of the highway. This is based on a speed study of US Highway 18 over Interstate Highway 29, in which the 85th percentile speeds justified a posted speed limit of 55 mph. This would continue the 55 mph speed zone posted on Lincoln County Road, which extends to the west of the Interchange.

WHO INITIATED THE CHANGE?

The Department of Transportation, in planning the Interchange reconstruction project.

SPEED STUDY:

Spot Speed Studies were conducted on the cross road near the centerline of Interstate Highway 29 for west bound and east bound traffic.






