- SUBJECT: Aircraft Dealer License Appeal

Roger Johnson of The Royal Company SD, Inc. is asking the Aeronautics Commission to waive the requirement of selling and/or brokering 6 aircraft in the past 24 month period so he may renew his dealer license for another 2 years.

Mr. Johnson has been a dealer off and on since 2009 and has three (3) aircraft listed as part of his dealership since 2015. He has sold 1 of the 3 to date and asks that the Aeronautics Commission allow him to be a plane dealer for another 2 years. Per his letter (attached), he has been unable to sell his remaining 2 aircraft due to a variety of reasons.

Our office recommends that Mr. Johnson be allowed to continue as a dealer for the next 2 years. If unable to sell his 2 remaining aircraft by then, the dealer will need to pay the taxes for each airworthy aircraft listed under his dealership.
