SUBJECT: Aircraft Dealer License Appeal

Justin Johnson of Skylancer Aviation is asking the Aeronautics Commission to waive the requirement of selling and/or brokering 6 aircraft in the past 24 month period so he may renew his dealer license for another 2 years.

Mr. Johnson has been a dealer since 2014 and has had four (4) aircraft listed as part of his dealership since then. His company is geared to buying unairworthy aircraft, restoring them and selling the now airworthy plane. At this time, the registration tax has been paid on one aircraft, 2 are airworthy and the 4th is not. Per his letter (attached), he has been unable to sell any of these planes due to a variety of reasons. This is Mr. Johnson's 2nd appeal to continue being an aircraft dealer in 4 years.

Our office recommends that Mr. Johnson be allowed to continue as a dealer for the next 2 years. If unable to sell them by then, the dealer will need to pay the taxes for each airworthy aircraft under his dealership.
