<u>CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL:</u> Chairman Robert McGrath called the meeting to order. The roll was called and a quorum was present.

Chairman McGrath announced that the meeting was streaming live on SD.net, a service of South Dakota Public Broadcasting.

<u>COMMISSION MEMBERS PRESENT:</u> Robert McGrath, John Forman, Paul Merriman, Becky Pitz, Patrick Snyder, Tina Titze, Andrew Canham, and Kim McIntosh.

COMMISSION MEMBERS ABSENT: Mike Carter and Dustin Willett.

PRESENT VIA TELEPHONE CONFERENCE CALL: Lori Reed, EPA Region VIII.

OTHERS PRESENT: See attached attendance sheets.

INTRODUCTIONS: Participants at the DDN sites introduced themselves.

<u>APPROVAL OF MINUTES FROM SEPTEMBER 12, 2017, MEETING:</u> Motion by McIntosh, seconded by Titze, to approve the minutes from the September 12, 2017, State Emergency Response Commission meeting. A roll call vote was taken, and the motion carried unanimously.

<u>HMEP GRANTS TRAINING AND PLANNING REPORT:</u> Autumn Stout, Office of Emergency Management, provided the quarterly review of training and planning grant activities.

Ms. Stout reported that about \$16,000 is remaining in the 2016 grant. Of that amount, \$6,465 has been re-allocated to Sioux Falls Fire Rescue for FY 2017 due to an unforeseen cancelled project in FY 2016; \$8,300 will be spent on a TEEX Pipeline Awareness/Operations course in the spring; and \$1,225 will be used for Dustin Willett's attendance at the Western Regions SERC Conference.

Twenty-six projects were completed using the 2016 grant funding. A total of 257 students were trained through the hazmat classes and nine personnel attended hazmat continuing education conferences.

For the 2017 grant, almost \$9,000 has been spent on projects, and about \$134,500 remains in the grant. Two projects have been completed: attendance at the Hot Zone conference in Houston for three personnel from Watertown Fire Rescue and attendance at the TEEX Transportation Specialist training for one member of Sioux Falls Fire Rescue.

NATIONAL ADVISORY COUNCIL FOR FEMA: Tina Titze reported that she attended her first meeting of the National Advisory Council. About 35 members attended this meeting. This was the National Advisory Council's first meeting with the new FEMA Administrator, Brock Long. Mr. Long asked the council to provide feedback on streamlining FEMA and different programs. The council was divided into three separate subcommittees, and Ms. Titze was assigned to the subcommittee related to mitigation and insurance topics. The subcommittee will look fulfilling some of Mr. Long's visions and give him ideas on simplifying programs as he decides to make certain changes within FEMA.

<u>REGIONAL RESPONSE TEAM (RRT) MEETING REPORT</u>: Kim McIntosh reported that October 17-18, 2017, she attended the RRT meeting in Denver, CO. Under the National Contingency Plan, the RRT is required to meet twice a year. At the meeting representatives of EPA talked about the agency going through a time of change – budget uncertainty, Superfund projects are a priority, and Region VIII employees being deployed to Hurricane Anna area and the wildfires in California.

Also discussed at the RRT meeting was sub-area contingency planning. Under the National Response Center, states, locals, EPA, and other federal entities work on these contingency plans for spills and releases on certain water bodies or segments of water bodies in Region VIII. The group has completed a draft contingency plan of the Missouri River and the Big Sioux River; and the plan outlines the potential sources for major oil spills, receptors, drinking water intakes, wells, threatened and endangered species, and contact information. It also establishes areas where booms can be deployed if there is a major oil spill. Please let Ms. McIntosh know if you'd like a copy of the plan.

During the RRT meeting, the US Department of Agriculture, EPA, and the Coast Guard provided updates on their response to hurricanes and wildfires. Health and Human Services gave a presentation on the lead impact to the drinking water system in Flint, MI. There were also discussions and presentations on Colorado's problems associated with the marijuana industry. There are both legal and illegal operations in the state. The US Forest Service and EPA are finding that there are several illegal grow operations on federal lands.

EPA also provided an update on the Belle Fourche pipeline crude oil release that occurred last winter in North Dakota.

<u>UPDATE ON RECENT SPILL AND STORAGE REPORTING</u>: Ms. McIntosh reported that rail storage is regulated by the federal Department of Transportation (DOT). There are aspects of rail storage that then can not only be regulated by DOT, but could also be regulated by EPA. There are a number of different federal laws that talk about rail storage and hazmat on rails. The Interstate Commerce Commission Termination Act pre-empts state and local laws. Some federal laws are pre-empted by this act. The Federal Hazardous Material Transportation law and the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA) also regulate jurisdiction.

Ms. McIntosh stated that from DENR's standpoint, if a facility is storing hazardous materials and the materials are in true storage and not under shipping papers, then the facility is obligated to report under EPCRA, the SERC, the LEPC, and the fire departments. Ms. McIntosh said that is probably a very sector of the hazmat sitting on rails sightings or rail lines. Most of the hazardous material that is sitting on rail lines is exempt. DENR would like to encourage both the railroads and the LEPCs and fire departments to have open communications with the railroads to try to encourage them to at least talk about what is being stored on site, how long that material will be there, and what their thoughts are on who's going to respond if one of these hazmat tankers leaks or starts on fire.

Ms. McIntosh provided an update on the TransCanada Keystone Pipeline crude oil release in Marshall County that was reported on November 16, 2017. There are two crude oil pipelines in South Dakota. The TransCanada Keystone pipeline is a hazardous material liquids pipeline that extends into Texas. The pipeline transports tar sands from Canada and conventional crude oil. It was constructed in 2008/2009 and the installation, operation, and safety operations on this pipeline are all regulated by the US Department of Transportation, Pipeline and Hazardous Material Safety Administration (PHMSA). The state of South Dakota does not regulate the installation, operation, and safety issues associated with the pipeline.

Ms. McIntosh discussed the timeline from the time the spill was reported to the time it was addressed. She presented a PowerPoint presentation showing pictures of the location of the spill. TransCanada is estimating 60 to 70 days to complete the cleanup.

<u>UPDATED TIER II REPORTS</u>: Trish Kindt reported she had sent the SERC members links for the DENR Title III and Tier II reporting form webpages.

Tier II reports are annual reports that are due by March 1. Certain facilities are required to report storage or agricultural chemicals, fuel, and other hazardous substances. When reporting storage, a facility doesn't just report the chemical name; they report other things such as the amount stored, the type of storage container, and the physical and health hazards of the stored substance. In the past, the reporting form only allowed a facility to report that a substance posed one of five physical or health hazards. It could either pose an immediate or chronic or health hazard or as far as physical hazards, it could be explosive, flammable, or be subject to a sudden release of pressure. In 2016, EPA amended 40 CFR Part 370, specifically the section that talked about the physical and health hazard reporting on Tier II forms. For Tier II reports that are due on March 1, 2018, facilities will have more options for reporting physical and health hazards. Instead of having only five categories available, they now have 13 physical hazard categories and 11 health hazard categories. Ms. Kindt discussed the list of categories.

Ms. Kindt noted that this year, the reminder letter that she sends to facilities telling them it's Tier II reporting season will include information on the new physical and health hazards. Ms. Kindt said Kelsey Newling and her will be available to help facilities with any questions they have regarding the Tier II reporting. She also noted that Tier II reporting workshops, which are held in the spring, will include information on the physical and health hazard options and the new reporting requirements.

Ms. Kindt answered questions from the SERC members.

<u>LEPC GRANT AWARDS</u>: Chairman McGrath stated that several of the SERC members also serve on various LEPCs. He stated that if any of the SERC members' LEPCs are requesting grants, that SERC member should abstain from voting on that particular funding request.

Chairman McGrath serves on the Brookings County LEPC and Becky Pitz serves on the Davison County LEPC. Dustin Willett and Mike Carter both serve on LEPCs but were not present during the meeting.

Trish Kindt reported that this year \$45,468.12 is available to award and 39 LEPC grant applications were received.

Ms. Kindt stated that she reviewed each application for compliance with the state and federal requirements. SDCL 1-50-10 and 42 USC 1101 outline things an LEPC must do in order to qualify for an LEPC grant. An LEPC has to submit a roster, elect officers, adopt bylaws, have quarterly meetings, have procedures for providing information to the public, provide public notice of meetings, complete an emergency plan, review and update that plan on an annual basis, and the LEPC needs to hold exercises.

Ms. Kindt noted that if the required information is missing from an LEPC grant application, she contacts the LEPC and tries to gather incorrect or missing information.

Two of the LEPCs had minor issue. Ms. Kindt stated that she has received email copies of the expenditure sheets from Custer and Hanson county LEPCs, but they need to provide a hard copy of their signed expenditure sheets.

Prior to the meeting, Ms. Kindt provided the SERC members with a list of LEPC grant applications and her recommendations and grant award amounts.

Chairman McGrath requested SERC action on the grant applications.

Motion by Forman, seconded by Merriman, to approve grant funds in the amounts shown on the table for the following 37 LEPCs: Beadle, Bennett, Bon Homme, Brown, Brule/Buffalo, Butte, Charles Mix, Clark, Clay, Codington, Custer, Day, Edmunds, Fall River, Grant, Hand, Hanson, Hyde, Kingsbury, Lake, Lawrence, Marshall, McPherson, Mellette, Miner, Minnehaha, Moody, Pennington, Perkins, Potter, Roberts, Spink, Todd, Turner, Union, War Hawk, and Yankton. A roll call vote was taken, and the motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Titze, seconded by McIntosh, to approve funding in the amounts shown on the table for Brookings and Davison LEPCs. A roll call vote was taken, and the motion carried with Titze, McIntosh, Forman, Merriman, Canham and Snyder voting aye. Pitz and McGrath abstained from voting.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Lori Reed, EPA, reported on recent activities of EPA Region VIII. She discussed the definition of "waters of the United States," concentrated animal feeding operations, and air emissions reporting.

Trish Kindt stated that over the past couple of years, the state and EPA have worked together to hold workshops. This past spring LEPC workshops designed for LEPC members and emergency managers were held. Two years ago, industry workshops were held. Because there was so much interest in the

2016 industry workshops, this summer more industry workshops will be held. Ms. Kindt has been working with Rebecca Broussard at EPA Region VIII on possible dates to hold the workshops. Topics that will be covered during the workshops will be spill and release reporting, Tier II reporting, risk management plans, the Toxic Release Inventory (TRI), Chemical Facility Anti-Terrorism Standards (CFATS) regulations, and spill prevention, control, and counter measures (SPCC) requirements.

Ms. Kindt will let the SERC know when the workshop plans are finalized.

The next SERC meeting will be March 26, 2018, via the DDN at 10:00 a.m. Central Time.

HMEP Grant Year 2016

- Twenty-seven projects were completed (two hazmat courses in Codington County, a Hazmat IQ Decon training, ARFF Spring Live Burn training, ARFF Fall Live Burn training, Blue Card online training, attendance at the IAFC conference, and attendance at the Safe Transportation Training Specialists training for Aberdeen Fire & Rescue, three hazmat courses in Edmunds County, hazmat plan updates/rewrites for Spink, Douglas, Aurora, and Hand Counties, commodity flow studies for Hanson, Lake, and Fall River Counties, attendance at the FDIC and IAFC conferences for a total of three personnel, a Hazmat IQ course, and attendance at the Safe Transportation Training Specialists training for Sioux Falls Fire Rescue, attendance at the Cold Zone and FDIC conferences for a total of five personnel, ARFF training, and attendance at the Safe Transportation Training Specialists training for Watertown Fire Rescue, attendance at a hazmat training at the Security and Emergency Response Training Center in Pueblo, Colorado for two personnel from the Rapid City Fire Department), and attendance at the Western Regions SERC Conference for one SERC member. A total of 257 students were trained through the hazmat classes and a total of ten personnel attended hazmat continuing education conferences.
- One training for Sioux Falls Fire Rescue (TEEX Pipeline Technician training at the Texas A&M facility in College Station, TX) was cancelled due to Hurricane Harvey. \$6,465 was allocated for this training, which was rolled over and re-allocated to the 2017 grant year.

HMEP Grant Year 2017

- Through the FY 2017 grant, funding was awarded to complete six hazmat plan updates/rewrites, one
 hazmat exercise, four hazmat awareness/operations trainings, attendance at five hazmat
 trainings/conferences for Aberdeen Fire Rescue, attendance at four hazmat trainings/conferences for
 Sioux Falls Fire Rescue, and attendance at five hazmat trainings/conferences for Watertown Fire Rescue.
- Six projects have been completed (attendance at the Hot Zone conference in Houston for three personnel from Watertown Fire Rescue, attendance at the TEEX Transportation Specialist training for one member of Sioux Falls Fire Rescue, and three hazmat awareness/operations courses in Codington County). A total of 74 personnel were trained through the hazmat classes.
