Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance, and Roll Call:

The South Dakota Board of Education Standards (BOES) was called to order by President Sly at approximately 1:02 p.m. CT.

A quorum of board was present.

Adoption of Agenda:

Motion by Heineman second by Willard to adopt the July 19, 2021, agenda. Voice vote. All present voted in favor. Motion carried. Voting aye: Heineman, Olsen, Nebelsick, Westra, Willard, Guffin, and Sly.

Approval of Minutes:

Motion by Nebelsick second by Olsen to approve the May 17, 2021, and July 9, 2021, minutes. Voice vote. All present voted in favor. Motion carried. Voting aye: Heineman, Olsen, Nebelsick, Westra, Willard, Guffin, and Sly.

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63 **Public Comment**

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65 There was no public comment.

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67 **Special Education Report:**

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69 Linda Turner, Director, Division Special Education and Early Learning, DOE, provided the annual
70 State Performance Plan Report and the progress being made in the Special Education Program.
71 The report included a detailed power point presentation. Turner gave a brief overview of the
72 report. Special Education Programs are divided into Part C, which is Birth to Three Programs
73 and Part B, which is preschool and school age population. The report today is on the Part B
74 programs for federal fiscal year 2019, reported in February 2021. The Individuals with Disabilities
75 Education Act (IDEA) requires each state to develop a state performance plan and an annual
76 performance report. Reporting progress on select indicators to demonstrate how state and local
77 education are working to improve education for students with disabilities. These are authorized
78 in a six-year package. This was the last reporting year in this package.

79

80 Turner stated that the state performance plan has 17 indicators, those are divided into results-
81 based indicators, which demonstrate growth and student performance, and success for after
82 they are out of school, and compliance indicators which are required as part of the special
83 education law. Current data for the years' reporting is included in the report. If there is slippage,
84 defined as a worsening of progress; the report includes reasons why there is slippage, and plans
85 for addressing them. The state reports results based on a target set with input from
86 stakeholders, along with reasons for slippage if the target was not met and if there was a
87 decrease in performance. Overall based on the information submitted as part of the State

88 Performance Plan and additional data utilized by the federal office of special education
89 programs, South Dakota received a rating of meets requirements for Part B and Part C.

90

91 Turner emphasized the importance of public awareness with districts and parents to know that
92 there will be a change of the measurements. There is a need to get stakeholder input and that
93 process has already begun.

94

95 **Recommended cut scores for praxis tests:**

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97 Carla Leingang, Director, Accreditation and Certification, DOE, requested approval of cut scores
98 for new and regenerated Praxis exams. Praxis exams are assessments utilized for educators to
99 prove competency in certain areas for licensure.

100

101 Leingang gave a brief overview of the process for setting the recommendations for the cut
102 scores.

103

104 Leingang requested that the board approve cut scores for seven Praxis exams: Journalism;
105 Physical Science; Principals of Learning & Teaching PreK-12; Music-Vocal; Music-instrumental;
106 Middle School Math; and Mathematics.

107

108 Leingang presented the recommended Praxis Cut scores.

- Journalism: recommended cut score 153

110

- Physical Science: recommended cut score 157

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- Principals of Learning & teaching Prek-12: recommended cut score 157

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- Music-Vocal: recommended cut score 153

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- Music-instrumental: recommended cut score 150

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- Middle School Math: recommended cut score 157

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- Mathematics: recommended cut score 159

117 Motion by Guffin second by Olsen to approve the Praxis Cut scores as presented. Voice vote. All
118 present voted in favor. Motion carried. Voting aye: Heineman, Olsen, Nebelsick, Westra, Willard,
119 Guffin, and Sly.

121 President Sly declared a recess at approximately 2:41 p.m. CT.

123 President Sly declared the meeting back to order at approximately 2:51 p.m. CT.

125 **Medical Cannabis and Schools Rules update**

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127 Amanda LaCroix, DOE reported that the Medical Cannabis and Schools rules were presented at
128 the Interim Rules Review Committee earlier this morning. They were approved as following
129 procedure for adoption of rules.

131 **Petition Update**

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133 Amanda LaCroix, DOE reported on the status of the petition that was presented by South Dakota
134 Council of School Attorneys (COSA) requesting the repeal of 24:28:01:01(54) to the Board at the
135 May 17, 2021 meeting. The board responded to the petition on June 4, 2021, denying the
136 request. A copy of petition and the response were filed with Legislative Research Council (LRC),
137 and Interim Rules Review Committee (IRRC) as required by statute.

138
139 LaCroix went on to state the DOE is preparing a workgroup for the fall of 2021, to identify any
140 issues around the long-term substitute definition.

141
142 **Secretary's Report**

143
144 Tiffany Sanderson reported on:

145
146 COVID Impact Survey and American Rescue Plan Funding, including information that nearly 90%
147 of all accredited schools (buildings) were in-person for most of the year. Early data is showing
148 there was a significant increase in the number of students who missed much of the school year
149 (30 days or more). In a typical year about 3% of public-school students miss 30 or more days, this
150 jumped to nearly 6.5% this last year. DOE staff is conducting monthly data digs:

- 151 • •June – COVID Impact Data + Attendance.
- 152 • •July/August – early assessment data and report card information like graduation rates.
- 153 • •September – Approved local plans – priorities, funding, etc. to make determinations for
154 state level supports and programs and provide technical assistance.

155
156 Workgroups and Boards.
157 Starting with the Social Studies Standards Revision Committee. The workgroup met in June 2021.
158 It included nearly 50 individuals. Internal DOE review is underway with the final proposal or
159 recommendations in the coming weeks. The public review and comment period will open in
160 August with public hearings to begin on September 20, 2021, in Aberdeen. A total of four
161 hearings will be held throughout SY2021-22. There will be seven other content areas' standards
162 under consideration at the hearings: Fine Arts; and six in Career and Technical Education
163 standards: Agriculture; Arts, A/V & Communications; Finance & Personal Finance; Health
164 Science; Human Services; and Manufacturing.

165
166 The Distance Learning Workgroup is charged with policy recommendations for the department's
167 consideration. Sanderson continued, stating that with all we've learned in the last year regarding
168 instructing from afar and all that's changed in technology in recent years, there is much to
169 discuss. By August 2021 they should have met three times. Their work may culminate in
170 proposed legislation or rules for this board's consideration.

171
172 The Teacher Compensation Review Board (TCRB) is an element of the Blue-Ribbon Task Force
173 which meets every 3 years. A report is due to the Governor and Legislature by September 30th.

174 The TCRB reviewed the recommendations of the task force from 2015 and action/progress on
175 those recommendations since. Early notes of interest:
176 In 2019-20, SD teacher salary was ranked 50th in country.
177

- 178 • Several states below us made large advances that year prior to move ahead of us
179 (ex. NM 13% increase).
- 180 • Last 20 states are within \$5,000 of one another.
- 181 • On a regional price parity basis (buying power), we're about 45th.
- 182 • Regionally, we're neck and neck with MT; other contiguous states are ahead of
183 us, but not by much.

184
185 Workforce pipeline and stability are the priorities at this point

- 186 • Transition more teacher ed graduates to the classroom.
- 187 • See if the impact of the COVID year, is a one-time occurrence or will be a trend
188 of large numbers of retirements or career changes.

189
190 They will be meeting again in late August 2021, to review additional data and review a draft
191 report.
