

C3 Observations & Next Steps

- Completion Rate 60.53% (OSEP 65%)
 - Several missing qualifying exit evaluations
 - Several received entry but no exit.
 - ▶ BDI2 and BDI3 confusion (FFY 2024 all BDI3)
- C3 has six data points (summary statements)
 - ▶ SD met targets in four of the six areas.
 - ▶ SD increased performance in all six areas.
- ▶ BDI3 (FFY2023 third year)
 - Norming of scores
 - ► C3b Knowledge and Skills and C3c Appropriate Actions
- ► Continued data analysis
- SEIDS Data System

State recommends not adjusting targets.
Two years remain in the existing SPP/APR package.
