


Construction Projects Near Completion: As the 2024-25 academic year kicks off, Lake Area Technical College (LATC) will open two new hallmark spaces that allow the campus to accept hundreds more students and for students to learn in world-class labs and classrooms.

The Dana J. Dykhouse Business Center and the Advanced Manufacturing Lab (a.k.a. "The Archway") will be home to LATC's Business, Financial Services, Robotics, and General Education programs. This expansion caps off the I'm IN Campaign that raised more than \$50 million for campus improvements and expansions in the last decade. The public is invited to join the LATC Community for a Ribbon Cutting and Open House on Thursday, September 26th.

The Dental program facilities will be freshly remodeled, including 10 operatories, a radiography lab, a materials lab, simulation center, and classroom. The new space will be full furnished with equipment purchased with state funds through Governor Noem and the Governor's Office of Economic Development (GOED) and Perkins grant funds. With the new facility and addition of the Dental Hygiene program for Fall 2025, LATC's Dental Assisting program has filled to capacity for Fall 2024.

The relocated program will begin in Fall 2024. New workforce training programs for the Women's Prison are being discussed with the SD Departments of Corrections and Labor.



Your Generosity Makes an Impact

In 2023, Mitchell Technical College was able to take advantage of an incredible match opportunity made possible through the State of South Dakota Governor's Office of Economic Development.

"In essence, the GOED provided \$3 million towards the purchase of new equipment for our programs, with the caveat that Mitchell Tech invest \$1.5 million in equipment in order to receive the funds," says MTC Chief Financial Officer Jared Hofer. "This allows our college to spend \$4.5 million on new equipment over the next two years. We are grateful we were able to meet the match criteria and take part in the program."



Grads on the Go

Mitchell Technical College graduates are finding success in the classroom and in their chosen fields, thanks to relevant coursework, knowledgeable instructors and programs that emphasize in-demand skill sets. These benefits, combined



Lawsuit with City of Rapid City Settled



The proactive efforts of WDTC legal counsel, State Sen. Dave Johnson, and Rapid City Mayor Jason Salamun were key in settling the disagreement between the Rapid City School District and the City of Rapid

City regarding the joint use of a burn tower between the RC Fire Department and WDTC. The City Council

approved a resolution for a settlement agreement a couple of weeks ago, and we are waiting to hear back from the school district on the final wording of the agreement before it is ready to sign. This dispute originated in 2017, when the College's former state property lease location on Sedivy Road was traded rather than put up for sale, which prevented the City from purchasing the lot for fire training.

Law Enforcement Academy Reciprocity Agreement Update



I shared at the April BoTE meeting in Watertown that former Pennington
County Sheriff, Kevin Thom, has been serving as a consultant to assist WDTC in getting back in good standing with the State Law Enforcement Academy's reciprocity agreement. I am very pleased to report our new program director,

Jonni Joyce, who has an extensive background in law enforcement and has worked for the past few years at a community college in Wyoming, has hit the ground running. (In her spare time, Jonni is a nationally renowned police dog trainer.) Joni has already met with Hank Prim and his team at the South Dakota Law Enforcement Academy to establish a collaborative relationship. We are on the Commission's Aug. 14 meeting agenda to provide the group with a full update on our program and to request reinstatement in the reciprocity agreement with the state academy. If the Commission approves the agreement, we will have no gaps in student eligibility to participate.

Our program director search committee included DCI staff and commissioners, and representatives from local and state law enforcement agencies. We appreciate their time and demonstrated commitment to WDTC's program success. Lake Area Technical College was also supportive in sharing their approach and insights. We are very grateful to everyone for their help and guidance.



Hot Springs Practical Nursing Cohort Site Approved for Student Financial Aid

We just received word from the Department of Education that WDTC has been approved to offer federal financial aid for qualifying students enrolling at the satellite Hot Springs location. Practical Nursing students will begin enrolling there for the beginning of WDTC's Fall Semester in August. We are, again, very grateful to community members (including those from the State Veterans' Home and Fall River Hospital) in Hot Springs, and local WDTC board members, for supporting and facilitating this effort. These off-site locations give prospective students who are "place bound" because of family, work, or other community obligations, the ability to take classes close to home and work close to home when they complete the program and pass their licensure exam. The partnership opportunities for CNA's to scaffold up to the Practical Nursing program are also exceptionally strong in Hot Springs. Adding this location also expands the number of Practical Nursing seats available in WDTC's program.

Rapid City Bus Routes Changing to Serve WDTC

RapidRide

With much new construction happening on the east side of Rapid City, the City's bus

service is changing to bring a line much closer to WDTC. Growth studies identify the new population center point for Rapid City as Cambell Street, which is roughly half a mile to the west of the WDTC campus, and currently the closest bus stop. Being in the heart of the city and

connected to many other locations in town with a bus service will significantly increase accessibility to WDTC. Staff at the transit office and city staff have been candid in laying out the issues with bringing a transportation line to the campus, and with lots of community and united support for change, have finally been able to get the needed resources to update the system's lines. We are told the new routes will be implemented in Fall 2024. Again, I would like to give Mayor Jason Salamun a shoutout for his support of WDTC.

Unique Housing & Partnership Efforts Positively Impacting Student Enrollment

Over the past two years, WDTC has experienced a significant decline in enrollment, largely due to the substantial increase in pay for low-skilled jobs in Rapid City. This economic shift has made immediate employment more attractive than pursuing further education. Additionally, a severe housing shortage and high rental prices have compounded the issue, particularly affecting students who live beyond a reasonable commuting distance to the college. These factors have created a perfect

storm, presenting substantial challenges
to maintaining enrollment numbers at

WDTC.

As I have reported previously, a housing partnership with a VRBO partner on Mt. Rushmore Rd. has assisted in filling some of the gap for over a year now, and now that the word is out about the housing option, we anticipate that space will max out this upcoming school year. This is an exciting event for us because it clearly demonstrates, for anyone who had any doubt, the need for WDTC to have affordable student housing available close to campus.

However, the tide is shifting, and we now are highly optimistic that we hit the low and are on the upward trend again. First, Spring Semester enrollment came in stronger than we anticipated, and Summer Semester enrollment exceeded expectations, as well. In addition, a fantastic partnership with Rapid City Area Schools' CTE programs has provided unprecedented collaborations between the schools and WDTC. We are grateful to District leadership for this collegiality and look forward to increasing opportunities for great paying careers for traditional-aged residents of Rapid City who might not be able to afford living away from home. High school staff have been welcoming and gracious in inviting WDTC to their campuses. We were also able to take this

innovative partnership to school districts outside Rapid City and anticipate increased numbers of young people deciding to take the two-year career-focused options as they hear from their friends and relatives about the success they have experienced at WDTC.

Two years ago, staff from a variety of WDTC departments kicked off a Strategic Enrollment Management Committee, and, since that time, several major process improvements have been

implemented. Everything from new software to new attitudes about how and when to

offer programming have been the flavor of these two years as we have held

tight through all the bumps in the road experienced during implementation. Using these new tools, we now see that we will meet or exceed enrollment targets set for the Fall Semester. We also have a highly trained trio in Financial Aid, who have not only smoothly managed issues with the new FAFSA, but also have handled new Veteran financial planning requirements and entered into an agreement with 2nd Chance Pell with the

State Department of Corrections and the Department of Labor to allow incarcerated individuals to attend classes at WDTC.

WDTC's innovative approach to "prison education programs" has been recognized by VERA, the HLC, and AACC and is being touted nationally as a model for other colleges to consider. We look forward to supporting a much broader community of learners and stand in support of efforts in Pennington County to bring additional reforms into play locally through providing the ability for city and county prisoners to receive micro credentials in a variety of both soft skills and job skills.

A Great Day for On-Campus Student Housing at WDTC



I reported at a recent BoTE meeting on WDTC's being selected as part of the Metallica Scholars Cohort. Wow! We thought the \$100,000 for direct support of students was amazing, but that was only the beginning. This new relationship with AACC (American Association of Community Colleges) and Metallica's All Within Our Hands Foundation has led to additional grants to support direct aid to students from the Lowe's Foundation and Carhartt. That, combined with solid support from the WDT Foundation Board led to an additional amazing adventure with a potential P3 agreement with Loop Capital. This investment and real estate company based in Chicago connected with the Metallica Scholars initiative to identify two-year colleges interested in a P3 partnership for student housing. WDTC quickly rose to the top of the list with architectural plans, support from HEFA, and rezoning and platting processes progressing well through municipality approvals. WDTC has nearly completed the platting process, and we have lots of ideas, based on extensive research and discussions with our sister colleges, about what will work financially for students in Rapid City.

Three representatives from Loop Capital and a staff member from AACC conducted an extensive site visit at WDTC during the first week of June. They had done their homework before arriving and were blown away by WDTC's commitment to a diverse student population, program performance and national recognitions. Thank you, Kay Schallenkamp, for taking time out of your schedule to attend the community meeting with Loop Capital. In addition to Kay, several local elected officials, local board and foundation board members, Elevate Rapid City staffers, and representatives from the John T. Vucurevich Foundation attended the meeting to demonstrate support for WDTC's efforts to build on-campus student housing. It was fantastic to hear about the possible partnerships and interest in on-campus student housing. (Mayor Salamun was on hand at the Camp Drive Event held at Black Hills Tire to greet the site visitors, who also participated in some community events while they were in town.)

Record Breaking Number of WDTC Build Dakota Scholarship Recipients and Industry Partners

WDTC has broken our own record for the second year in a row for Build Dakota industry sponsors and student scholarship recipients, many of whom live in the off-campus WDTC housing with our VRBO partner. Our scholarship team has excelled in acquiring partner support both for Build Dakota and local WDTC scholarship programming.

Note:

- There are 140 Build Dakota Cohort 10 recipients.
- 97 of the 140 recipients are sponsored by industry. (\$884,000 in support.)
- There is \$2.7 million in anticipated Build Dakota scholarship awards.

Students receiving Build Dakota Scholarships, and sponsors, were recognized in a special ceremony at the college on June 27. This, the second year for the popular event, is similar a student sports signing day.



Student Retention Back in the Black



After a thorough review of factors influencing the past couple of years' retention dips, WDTC is back on track and training new staff in the Success Center. Many of you likely remember that the John T. Vucurevich Foundation provided WDTC with six years of "seed money" for the coaching program, and the trust this Foundation extended to us and our early successes because of their support gives us a sense of obligation to get back on track with best practices and proven strategies. We are very happy to see an increase in Fall to Spring Semester retention back up at 76%, improving from 69% the previous year. This data is based on our internal cohort retention model, which is also broken out by

program for faculty to review each year through our planning

processes, so it looks different from the state retention reports.)

In addition to this shift to get back to the methods that our data demonstrates work, WDTC has also added some new methods to support our residential students currently off campus, but soon on campus at WDTC: a staff member to assist students with transportation around town when needed, and, student activities both on campus and for students in our off-campus housing. Finally, we were inspired by Lake Area Tech's movement to join the NJCAA by adding Esports, and we plan to do likewise. Perhaps students will experience some fun, in-state technical college competition!
