SCOTT CARBONNEAU JOINS LATC AS DEAN OF STUDENT

SERVICES: Scott Carbonneau officially joined Lake Area Tech on April 1st as the Dean of Student Services. Carbonneau will lead the team at Lake Area Tech that supports students in non-academic capacities including recruitment, admissions, enrollment services, financial aid, resources for student success, campus life activities, and career services.

"For as long as I can remember, Lake Area Tech has held a special place in my heart," Carbonneau said. "My father joined Lake Area Vocational Technical Institute in 1970 and I am incredibly honored to follow in his footsteps more than 50 years later. I'm also excited to give back to the community where I grew up and reconnect with friends and colleagues."

LATC STUDENT LEADERS VISIT LEGISLATIVE SESSION: In January, five members of Lake Area Technical College's Student Voice joined President Sanderson and Vice President Corey in Pierre for the legislative session. Activities included seeing the House and Senate in session; attending the technical college's budget hearing with the Joint Committee on Appropriations; dining with lobbyists to learn about the behind-the-scenes elements of policy making; attending committee meetings; and visiting Speaker of the House Hugh Bartels and House Majority Leader Will Mortenson in their offices.



Student Voice provides LATC students a say in campus policy and decisions by

establishing direct, open dialogue between students and Lake Area Tech administration. Representing all LATC students, membership consists of delegates elected by the students in each program.

LATC Programs

LAW ENFORCEMENT ARTICULATION: Students who have graduated with a Lake Area Technical College Law Enforcement AAS degree may now fully transition to South Dakota State University's Criminology program under an articulation transfer agreement established to help students gain a bachelor's degree in Criminology and a minor in Sociology in less than two years. The Board of Regents approved this agreement in December.

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REGISTERED NURSING RECOGNITION: Registered Nursing. Org published their <u>top RN programs in SD</u>, considering results from 2018-22. Lake Area Tech was the only 2-year RN college in the top 5, ranking 2nd behind Augustana and ahead of USD, SDSU, and the University of Sioux Falls. The rankings consider NCLEX pass rates, tuition costs, program length, partnerships, and the number of cohorts run each year.

TAX PREPARATION SERVICES PROVIDED: In mid-March, second year Financial Services: Accounting Option students wrapped up the 2023 tax prep season. This concluded LATC's 35th year of providing free tax services through the IRS Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program. Tax clients came from a 90-mile radius. The 15 student tax preparers were on-site for four hours, four times per week over six weeks. They prepared 459 free returns.

TOP 10 2024-25 MILITARY FRIENDLY SCHOOL: LATC has earned the 2024-2025 Military Friendly® Top 10 School designation among similar-sized two-year colleges across the country. This is the 14th year Lake Area Tech has received the Military Friendly[®] School award and the first time it has obtained Top 10 status.

The designation is recognition for Lake Area Tech having meaningful and sustained education paths for the military community. The college is currently serving 107 students who are military-connected. Twenty-one Lake Area Technical College employees are veterans or actively serving in the guard or reserves.

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Ag Power Diesel Lab Building Ribbon-Cutting

Under a year after its groundbreaking, the ribbon was cut on Mitchell Tech's new 36,410-square foot Ag Power Diesel Lab Building March 21. The facility opened in January, with students in both the Ag and Light Truck programs hitting the ground running, learning and working in the new space.

In addition to enhancing the educational experience for the Diesel Power programs, the new facility impacted five other programs by freeing up space they were sharing with the Diesel Power programs and allowing them to better use the space to meet the needs of students pursuing careers in Power Sports and Agricultural programs. Completion of the project also fulfills Mitchell Tech's long-term goal of getting all programs onto one central campus.

Students from the Agricultural and Transportation Division, as well as approximately 80 guests, gathered in the lab to celebrate its completion and the opportunity to move forward with other goals. Speakers at the event included MTC President Mark Wilson, BOTE Executive Director Nick Wendell, Lt. Gov. Larry Rhoden, S.D. State Engineer Stacy Watters and MTC Division Leader Devon Russell. Jenna Reis and Brad Greenway also represented the S.D. Board of Technical Education. Local legislator Lance Koth attended, as well as the full Mitchell Board of Education and several representatives from the Mitchell City Council, Mitchell Chamber of Commerce and Development Corporation, industry leaders and other community supporters.

In January, the former Diesel Power building was sold to Spencer Quarries for \$750,000.

Program Announcements

Wi-Fi & Broadband Technologies



The Wi-Fi and Broadband Technologies program accepted an electric-powered fiber optic splicing trailer from FS3, Inc., and CORE PRO in March. The state-of-the-art trailer valued at nearly \$50,000 carries technicians' tools to the site of an outage and allows them to work efficiently in the safety and comfort of a climate-controlled shelter, protecting both them and their equipment in inclement weather and/or unstable ground conditions.

Construction Programs

Student-built house #109 will be sold by a realtor this spring. A student showcase event is planned for 5-7 p.m. on April 3-4. The house is a collaborative project for the Architectural Design and Builiding Construction, Electrical Construction and Maintenance and Heating and Cooling Technologies programs.

Precision Ag Technology



Students in the Precision Ag Technology program are nearing completion on their second annual collaborative planter build with Agtegra. The program sees students work alongside Agtegra employees -- many of them Mitchell Tech graduates -- to build a 26-row planter for the cooperative. The project prepares them to build precision agricultural equipment, which helps them anticipate problems they might encounter as technicians or users of similar equipment, enabling them to more handily fix them when the time comes.

Accounting



For the third year, Accounting students are offering free income tax preparation for qualifying individuals through the federal Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. The students are on track to file their highest-yet number of tax preparations, with appointment schedules full nearly every week this season.

Business Management



Business Management students recently concluded a 10-week trading period in the S.D. Stock Market Game. Teams from Mitchell Tech placed 1st and 2nd in the collegiate level of competition, earning a 6.3% return on their hypothetical \$100,000 investments. The students were awarded monetary prizes for their successes.

Western Statewide CTE Consortium Annual Meeting

On March 4, Fawn Wilde, Director of Western Statewide CTE Consortium, hosted the Western Statewide CTE Consortium Annual Meeting at WDTC. Eighty people attended this year's meeting, which included CTE teachers, administrators, and counselors/ advisors from the 21 member school districts, as well as five school districts that are part of the Three Rivers Special Services Co-op, Department of Labor Regional Specialists, AHEC, and AI experts. The meeting provides an opportunity for all the participating districts to gather for professional development, networking, collaboration, data evaluation, and to review and plan to improve and enhance CTE programs.



Criminal Justice Camp Well Attended



On March 15, 75 students from Central High School, Lakota Tech, and Custer High School, participated in the WDTC campus for a Criminal Justice Camp. Topics included a forensic demonstration, weapons and tactics, learning about career and scholarship opportunities, and hearing from recent program graduates.

Articulation Agreement Update with State Law Enforcement Academy

We continue to focus on needed updates to get the Articulation Agreement with the State Law Enforcement Academy back in place. WDTC is working with a consultant to WDTC to help guide this project. Academic staff are developing an information sharing process and plan. As appropriate, the Vice President for Teaching & Learning is providing updates to the advisory board.
