## The South Dakota Advisory Panel Overview

The South Dakota Advisory Panel, composed of individuals from around the state and selected by the Governor of South Dakota, advises the Department of Education, Special Education Programs (SEP) on issues related to students with disabilities.

In compliance with this responsibility, the panel conducted public meetings in Pierre. The panel also provided access statewide through South Dakota Public Broadcasting.

The panel's role as a stakeholder group for Special Education includes providing suggestions and advice to the State Department of Education on critical issues regarding special education services throughout South Dakota.

The SEP wishes to thank the panel for their assistance and guidance.

Panel priority for the past year focused on updating Parental Awareness of Rights and Procedural Safeguards Handbook.

### Requirement in the Administrative Rules of South Dakota

### 24:05:14:18. State advisory panel -- General.

The department shall establish and maintain an advisory panel for the purpose of providing policy guidance with respect to special education and related services for children with disabilities in the state.

### 24:05:14:19. State advisory panel -- Membership.

The advisory panel must consist of members appointed by the Governor, or any other official authorized under state law to make such appointments, be representative of the state population, and be composed of individuals involved in, or concerned with, the education of children with disabilities, including:

- (1) Parents of children with disabilities, ages birth through 26;
- (2) Individuals with disabilities;
- (3) Teachers;

(4) Representatives of institutions of higher education that prepare special education and related services personnel;

(5) State and local education officials, including officials who carry out activities under subtitle B of title VII of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, as amended to January 1, 2007;

(6) Administrators of programs for children with disabilities;

(7) Representatives of other state agencies involved in the financing or delivery of related services to children with disabilities;

(8) Representatives of private schools;

(9) Not less than one representative of a vocational, community, or business organization concerned with the provision of transition services to children with disabilities;

(10) A representative from the state child welfare agency responsible for foster care; and

(11) Representatives from the state juvenile and adult corrections agencies.

A majority of the members of the panel must be individuals with disabilities or parents of children with disabilities, ages birth through 26.

### 24:05:14:20. State advisory panel -- Duties.

The advisory panel shall:

(1) Advise the department of unmet needs within the state in the education of children with disabilities;

(2) Comment publicly on any rules proposed by the department related to the education of children with disabilities;

(3) Advise the department in developing evaluations and reporting on data to the U.S. Secretary of Education under section 618 of the IDEA;

(4) Advise the department in developing corrective action plans to address findings identified in federal monitoring reports under Part B of the IDEA; and

(5) Advise the department in developing and implementing policies related to the coordination of services for children with disabilities.

### Panel Responsibilities

- 1. Advise the State Education Agency (SEA) of unmet needs within the State in the education of children with disabilities.
- 2. Comment publicly on any rules or regulations proposed by the State regarding the education of children with disabilities.
- 3. Advise the SEA in developing evaluations and reporting on data to the Secretary under section 618 of the Act.
- 4. Advise the SEA in developing corrective action plans to address findings identified in Federal monitoring reports under Part B of the Act.
- 5. Advise the SEA in developing and implementing policies relating to the coordination of services for children with disabilities.
- 6. Review and comment on final due process hearing findings and decisions.
- 7. Advise on eligible students with disabilities in adult prisons. The advisory panel also shall advise on the education of eligible students with disabilities who have been convicted as adults and incarcerated in adult prisons.

# Membership

The advisory panel is made up of eighteen panel members from across South Dakota. Ten of those members are parents of children with disabilities and individuals with disabilities, which represent 51% of the membership.

# Panel Priority – Parental Awareness of Rights and Procedural Safeguards

### Panel Recommendations:

The panel chose to continue their work on updating the <u>South Dakota Parental Rights</u> <u>and Procedural Safeguards handbook</u> for the 18-19 year. The purpose of revision is to make the document parent friendly, reduce the number of pages, improve the look, update contacts, and include definitions.

#### Activities:

#### September 18, 2018

- Discussion on how to make the handbook more parent friendly
  - o Introduction Paragraph
  - Frequently asked questions section
  - Update Contacts
  - Create box for district contact on front of the booklet
- Request state lead to have a draft of the proposed suggestions by January
- Advisory Panel members will research other state handbooks and provide suggestions at January meeting.

#### January 16, 2019

- Students from Dakota Wesleyan University (DWU) may assist with redesigning the handbook to make it more visually appealing.
- Discussion on whether the handbook is available in other languages.
- Further recommendations:
  - Add email to all contacts
    - Workgroups were formed to review the current handbook and provide feedback at the April meeting.
- Tentative release date is Fall 2020.

### April 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2019

- Groups disseminated and discussed the updates they would like to see in the handbook.
- Large group discussion and recommendations made to state lead
- Groups will submit recommended changes by May 1<sup>st</sup> so that state lead can develop a draft guide to present to the panel in June.

### June 12, 2019

- State lead provided the panel with a mock draft of the Procedural Safeguards that was developed based on panel feedback.
  - The panel broke into groups to review the changes and provide additional feedback
  - State lead will compile final feedback and work with Donna to get DWU to redesign.

<u>September 18, 2018:</u>

- Advisory panel chose to continue the work on the Parental Awareness of Rights and Procedural Safeguards.
- Advisory Panel members subcommittee will develop and present at the Special Education Conference in March on Parent Rights and Indicator 8 Parent Survey.

### <u>January 16, 2019</u>

### <u>June 12, 2019</u>

- ECF applications have been submitted and are in the process of being reviewed.
  - Linda Turner explained the risk rubric the committee uses to determine approval.
  - ECF committee developed through legislature will continue to look at needs.

### September 18, 2018

- Extraordinary Cost Fund (ECF) Summer Study Update. There are 5 bills that were drafted and will be presented during the legislative session 2019. Those bills can be found at <u>SD Legislative Site.</u>
- LEAD-K workgroup: Information can be found at the Boards and Commission website under <u>Board of Regents.</u>
- Federal office of Special Education has postponed the updated regulation regarding Significant Disproportionality to 2020.

### <u>January 16, 2019</u>

- Senate Bill 23 and 24 are DOE sponsored. 23 is set up to clean up language in statute and 24 is set up to add flexibility to regulations on what grades are tested.
- Panel had discussions on Alternate Assessment and what drives the adoption of new assessments/reasons we change.

### April 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2019

- Linda Turner provided an update on the ECF committee.
- Linda Turner reviewed all the bills introduced to the legislature and reviewed the outcomes.
- Lead-K (2018 legislation) Kim Wadsworth shared information on hearing levels and why the group was created. Kim shared resources with the group.

### <u>June 12, 2019</u>

- Angel Corrales and Melissa Flor explained Significant Disproportionality and the new Office of Special Education requirements.

 Online training modules have been developed for evaluators in South Dakota assessing students ages birth to age 5 using the Battelle Developmental Inventory for federal progress monitoring requirements.

# 4. Advise the SEA in developing corrective action plans to address findings identified in Federal monitoring reports under Part B of the Act.

### <u>January 16, 2019</u>

 State Special Education Programs presented on the State Performance Plan (SPP) submitted to the Federal Office of Special Education Programs February 1<sup>st</sup> of each year. Additional information on the SPP can be found at the end of this report.

### <u>June 12, 2019</u>

- Melissa Flor presented on Special Education Accountability Monitoring process.
  - Purpose of monitoring
  - What districts/agencies are monitored and the 5-year cycle
  - Procedures used during reviews
  - Common findings of non-compliance
  - Corrective Action Plans
  - Public Reporting
- Requested feedback on corrective actions and other suggestions to improve compliance and results for students with disabilities.

5. Advise the SEA in developing and implementing policies relating to the coordination of services for children with disabilities.

### September 18, 2018

- Graduation requirement guidance for students with disabilities in SD have been updated along with endorsements.
  - The regulations for graduation have not changed and guidance better clarify the requirements.
  - Special Education programs requested input on what changes can be made to make the requirements easier to understand.

### January 16, 2019

- Brandi Gerry, Implementation Specialist Special Education Programs, presented on the State Personnel Development Grant (SPDG)
  - Competitive grant awarded by the U.S. Department of Education.
  - Goal is to improve reading results K-5 for students with learning disabilities.
  - Request for volunteers to serve on the SPDG stakeholder group.

### April 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2019

- Brandi Gerry explained the State Systemic Improvement Pan (Indicator 17) initiative.
  - Activities
  - Reviewed state results
  - Next steps

### <u>June 12, 2019</u>

- Indicator 14 measures post-secondary outcomes of students who have graduated or aged-out. Data is collected through a survey conducted by Black Hills State University. School districts also have the option of having their staff complete the survey calls.
- Special Education Programs conducts a statewide data drill down focusing on special education data to improve programs and identify areas of professional development needed.

### State Performance Plan Indicators

The Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA) of 2004 requires all states to have in place a <u>State Performance Plan (SPP)</u> that evaluates the State's efforts to implement the requirements and purposes of IDEA and describes how the State will improve student performance/achievement. (See US Dept. of State Performance Plans) The SPP describes how each state will improve results for students and comply with the IDEA. It is a six-year plan covering FFY 2005-2010, with annual performance reports each February through which the state will report on its progress in meeting the targets established in the SPP.
