

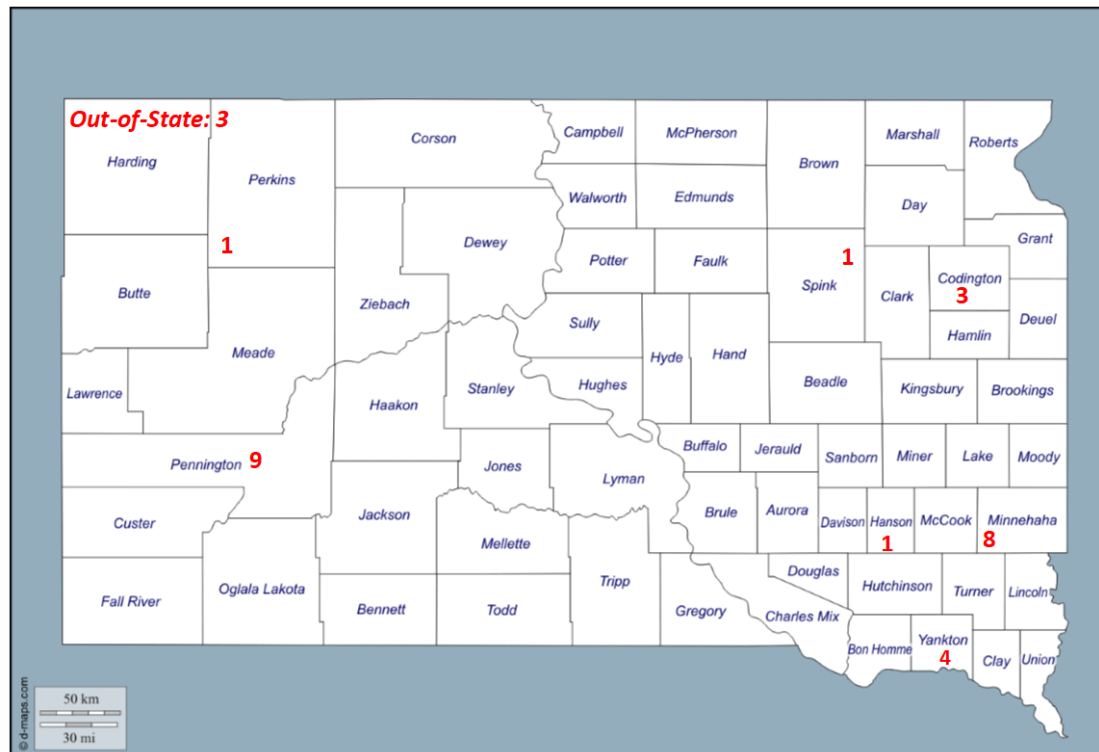
Speed up court process and shorten jail stays

Status	Policy	Progress
	21-day timeframe for completing competency evaluations	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Average is estimated at 30 days
	Report timeliness data	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Process developed for data to be collected• Court case management system set up• Challenge: judicial and attorney education
	Other professionals able to conduct competency evaluations, with training	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Training identified• SD module drafted and programmed• Scholarships planned• Letter to be distributed to the professional boards make people aware of the scholarship opportunity



	Competency fund	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 41 total claims<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 22 were “good”• 19 not payable on their face• 22 “good claims” total \$21,362• 19 not payable on their face<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 3 not competency exams• 6 unclear if the exam was competency or something else• 10 for competency plus something else (bill was not clear how much the competency exam cost)



	Mental health training for jail officers at least once every 4 years	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Selected SAMHSA “Creating Safe Scenes” online training• Requested all jail officers complete training by December 2018
	Mental health training for state prison officers at least once every 4 years	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• All officers trained in Mental Health First Aid• All officers trained in Dialectical Behavioral Therapy

	Mental health training for court services officers	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Mental health topics on spring 2017 training agenda• Planned for April 11, 2018: Trauma Responsive Court training (3 hours)
	Mental health training for judges	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Completed Judicial Work at the Interface of Mental Health and Criminal Justice Training (3.5 hours) in May 2017
	DSS to compile list of services and eligibility criteria annually for distribution to judges, CSOs, jails	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Brochures developed and distributed

Jail Data Collection Pilot

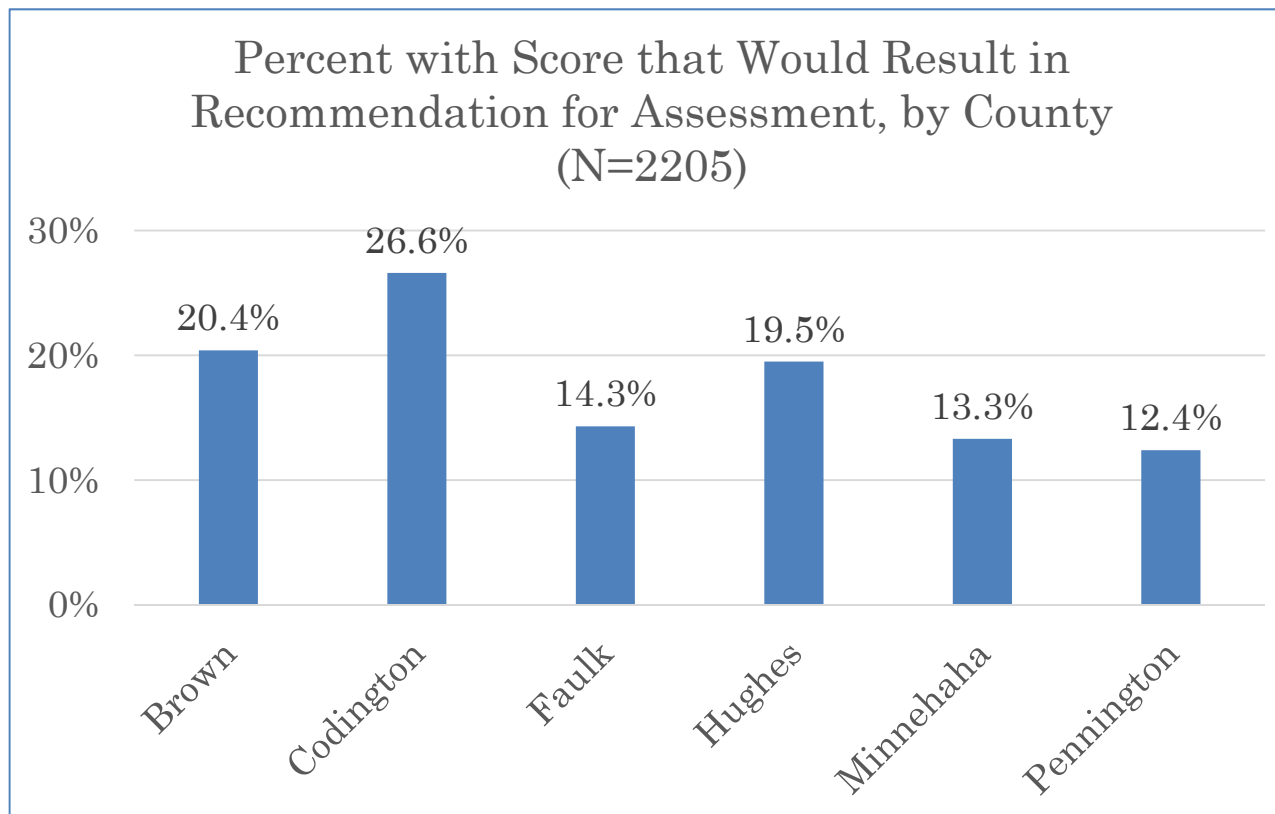
By mid-march:

- 2,278 forms received
- 73, or 3%, refused to participate in data collection

County	Number Participating	Number of Refusals	Refusal Rate
Brown	280	10	4%
Codington	109	0	0%
Faulk	28	0	0%
Hughes	41	3	7%
Minnehaha	1165	52	4%
Pennington	582	8	1%

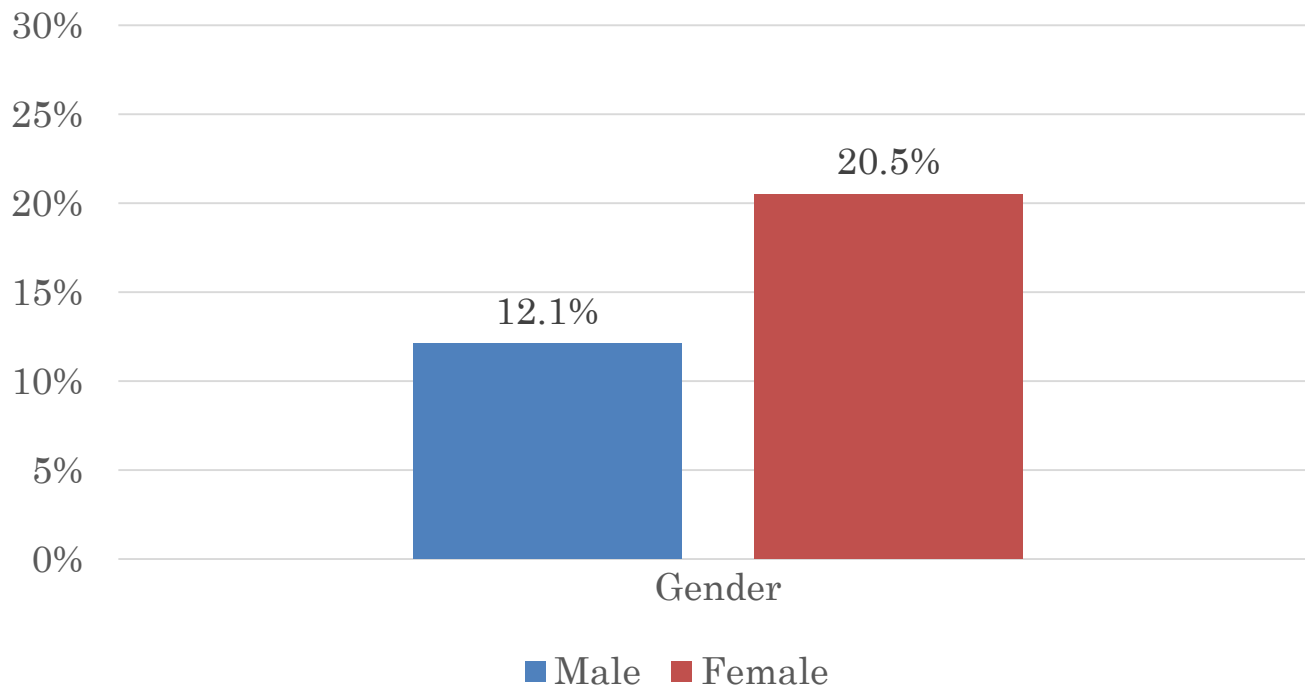
Jail Data Collection Pilot

- 2,205 completed forms received (non-refusals)
- 15% resulted in a score that would indicate an assessment is recommended

	Collect data from probation on referrals	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Developed data report• UJS and DSS working together to implement screening process
	Studying needs and options to improve linkages between the criminal justice and mental health system	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• The Services Workgroup discussed using the Sequential Intercept Model or similar framework to examine local needs and resources, starting with the communities participating in the jail data collection pilot program
