The Governor's House Program employs offenders where they learn marketable skills for life outside of prison.








Figure 2.3 profiles the offender jurisdictional population on June 30, 2025.





Figure 2.4 presents the June 30, 2025 offender population by their serious offense, divided into violent, non-violent, and drug categories for males and females.

Offender Serving Life Sentences




Figure 2.10: On June 30, 2025, there were 171 (5%) offenders in state correctional facilities who were serving life sentences. One of the offenders sentenced to life also has a death sentence.

95% of the offenders in prison will be released.




Length of Stay

Figure 2.41 displays the length of time offenders who released in FY2025 were in a state correctional facility prior to their release to parole or discharge.

Male offenders had the largest population of offenders leaving after one year or less with 634 (57%) offenders.

More than three fourths (319, 76%) of female offenders were also in a state correctional facility for one year or less prior to their release to parole or discharge.





Offender Work Activity





Figure 2.14 shows the number of offenders assigned to an institutional work activity or work release compared to the number of offenders who were not assigned on July 30, 2025.

In Figure 5.10, the gray bar shows the number of offenders who were assessed during the fiscal year.


The aqua dot indicates the number of offenders diagnosed with a SUD.

In FY2025, 1,596 (91%) assessed males and 642 (97%) assessed females were identified as having a SUD.



Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)

The SDDOC MAT program is designed to couple FDA approved medications with substance use disorder counseling and mental health care as appropriate for each individual offender.



- Figure 5.11 shows the number of MAT initiations and the number of MAT releases by month.
- The teal line represents the number of offenders who were still receiving MAT at the end of each month.






Mike Durfee State Prison is the only facility that offered programming in all four program categories.















Figure 5.16: Treatment Program Availability by Facility on June 30, 2025







Successful treatment program completions were comprised of 1,346 males (Figure 5.19) and 317 females (Figure 5.20).


Both males and females had the largest number of completions associated with CBISA treatment programs.

SPOT: State Prison Obedience Training





- Dog training program at Mike Durfee State Prison
- Partnership with Heartland Humane Society
- Offenders train high energy dogs to increase their adoptability.
- Teach dogs basic obedience and socialization skills.

- In2Work Program is offered by Aramark Food Services
- Offenders develop knowledge and skills to work in industrial kitchens
- Three phase classroom & hands-on training
- Includes ServeSafe certification.
