

The SDACDE Outreach Grant for 2020 was another huge success for the Conservation Districts. Although changes were made due to the covid pandemic, our association was able to continue with our outreach efforts in promoting conservation. Districts have been afforded the opportunity to host events, attend tours and hold teaching sessions.

In March, the Employees Association held the Annual Leadership Training Conference in Pierre. This was an excellent training conference which included Windbreak Training, Customer Service, Rural and Urban Stress Management, and National Conservation Planning Partnership Websites and its value to Conservation Districts. We were very fortunate to have some really great speakers. Nathan Hylla is a motivational speaker who entertained with ideas on Customer Service and Working with Partners. Car Oehlke spoke on Stress Management. Rhonda Kelsch, President of NCDEA spoke on the National Conservation District Employees Activities and Tracie Everson educated the group on Sexual Harassment in the Workplace. The final day of Leadership was dedicated to the Big Sioux Nursery with training and their annual meeting. There were forty eight (48) Conservation District employees present for the three day training; representing forty three (43) districts. Sponsors are sought to keep the cost to a minimum so Conservation Districts can afford to send their employees. Hourly wages and mileage to this event are used as a match for the grant funding. Through our trainings, our Association is able to carry out our vision statement. The SDACDE Vision Statement: To promote the professional development of its members, creating leaders with the skills and knowledge to deliver our conservation message. This all leads to furthering our cause through promotional opportunities. The better trained our employees are, the better prepared we are to promote conservation.

This summer our outreach activities included a booth set up for one full day at the Dakota Fest in Mitchell and Sheep Day at the Black Hills Stock Show. Employees volunteer to fill all shifts available. With the assistance of NRCS, our association was able to host a table at the Central States Fair for the entire week. We distribute our promotional items at these events; which include the "stress" trees, and the neon green back packs. Just recently purchased are shopping bags with the South Dakota Conservation Districts logo on them. These will be used at future events. The back packs are a huge hit with the kids! Our biggest event is typically the SD State Fair, however, due to the pandemic, and for the safety of our employees, the Board of Directors voted to not participate this year. Rainfall and wind simulator demonstrations were held at local

schools. Most Arbor Day celebrations were cancelled, however, the districts were able to receive and judge the essays; present winners with certificates and continue write ups in the local newspapers. Winter Farm show, Home Shows, and Legislative Dinners were attended. Social media has become essential to the business world. Most districts now have websites and Facebook pages to educate the public on services and activities. Most recently a U-Tube video was created promoting the SD conservation Districts; find it at <u>https://youtu.be/kLXVn4doBPA</u> and more of these interviews are in the works.

Without the funding from the Conservation Commission, many of these outreach events would not have been possible. Our conservation districts will continue to benefit for many years to come from the resources we have been allowed through this grant. Thank you for continuing to provide this resource.

This is the final report for the South Dakota Conservation Commission grant 2019-CWS-031. The NRS, Shauna Kopren and later Tiffany Martin, has worked closely with the six northwest South Dakota Conservation Districts to promote tree planting, forest health, outreach, and conservation. The NRS has and continues to work with numerous organizations and entities including the US Forest Service, Ducks Unlimited, Pheasants Forever, South Dakota State University, US Fish and Wildlife Service, SD Game, Fish, and Parks, Natural Resources Conservation Service, Farm Service Agency, and the six northwest SD Conservation Districts.

Below is a list of the NW Area Forester activities and accomplishments.

CRP and EQIP Tree Planting

- Assist NRCS with the planning of five EQIP tree plantings in 2019
- Currently assisting four producers plan CRP tree planting for 2020

201-CSW-031 Tree Planting Grant

The Roberts Conservation District Tree/Shrub Livestock Shelter 2020 was able to offer financial assistance to Jared Bartnick (landowner) for the planting of trees and shrubs. The planting will provide resource benefits for reduction of wind and soil erosion, livestock protection, snow management to farmsteads, roadways, and croplands.

Additional benefits include improved air quality, conservation of energy resources, increased wildlife habitat, and the associated economic benefits to the landowner.

This project was .31 acres. The cost share was applied and limited to the planting and fabric installation costs.

Highlights of this planting include proper planting depth during installation and homeowner maintaining weed control and supplementing water to the newly planted trees/shrubs.

The landowner was busy in a field and not able to be present during planting. He instructed the team to drive his tractor for him, since he was busy. The soil was decently worked up but could have been worked a bit more and wider. Despite the soil being on the clumpy side, and the width was too narrow, the trees and shrubs look exceptional, as well as the fabric.

The Conservation Districts are already planning for the 2021 tree planting season. Part of that planning process is reviewing our financial records to decide on how to make our businesses profitable yet manageable for producers to plant trees. Nurseries and truckers are also increasing rates affecting our prices which will be ultimately passed on to our producers. The Coteau Area would like to recommend an increase for the rate of Machine Planted Trees and Fabric & Installation to:

Machine planted trees \$.37/ft Fabric installation \$.64/ft

NRCS and FSA are now using linear feet instead of rods for their dockets. The Districts in the Coteau Area will also be revising their cost share pricing from rods to linear feet as it is less complicated for producers and invoice sharing within departments. Would the Commission consider the revision from rods to linear feet as well?

The EAB will be making the daunting task of renovating many of our farmstead shelterbelts a reality. As previously presented in the past years to the commission board, we again request a review of grant cost shares to producers completing renovation work themselves. The cost of equipment, fuel and time to complete a tree renovation is becoming very expensive. In order to keep the total project cost down many producers will be doing the work themselves. We ask the board to please reconsider offering cost share to producers for their own labor.

Thank you for your time as you review these current cost share docket revisions. Your effort in financially assisting our producers and districts with their conservation needs is very appreciated.

Afternoon Bill,

After asking for more input from all the districts, I have heard back from ~17 districts. They are all in agreement that the landowner should be able to receive some compensation for the labor of a tree renovation. However, it's so hard to put an exact number on it.

So I have included some of the comments from the Districts.

I know several mentioned that taking out of shrub rows is not as difficult or time consuming as the large trees, especially if they are dead or dying. So they felt that maybe there should be a different pricing for shrubs <6' and trees > 6'. Again...not an easy task for the commission board to undertake in making a decision on compensation.

NRCS docket could be used as a guideline when making their decision.

I've only worked on a few tree renovations with the grant cost sharing, but I know I've issued checks for \$28 to one producer and \$128 to another. So after all their work it was awkward to give them a small check, when I know they had completed hours of difficult work in their shelterbelts.

Not sure if I have the right answer for the commissioner's decision, but the districts just wanted them to know we need to be helping our SD landowners with their shelterbelt renovations.

- * Landowner labor can be counted as in-kind match only at a rate of \$25.00 per hour for installation of approved practices. Landowner use of equipment can also be counted as in-kind match towards the local match requirements.
- 1. All practices must meet state & local ordinances (such as distance from roadway to prevent excessive snow deposition, power-line & other right-of-way standards, etc).
- 2. Payment based on actual bills/receipts submitted by the producer. Cost-share paid on legitimate costs up to the specified maximum.
- 3. All cost-shared practices require a Resource Management Plan (practice plan).
- 4. Clean outs on dugouts not cost-shared within the expected lifespan of the practice.
- 5. Payment will be made on either fabric or chemical/mechanical weed & pest control for tree plantings but not both on an individual site.
- Monoslope/hoop barn must be replacing an existing animal feeding operation and the existing lots must be abandoned and reclaimed.
