



- Foster Care-Very Limited





#### **Juvenile Commitments**

Prior to system reform **70**% of all DOC commitments were for STATUS offenses & MISDEMEANORS. Only 1 of the top ten committing offenses was a felony- 3<sup>rd</sup> degree Burglary.

Today, 1/3 of youth are committed for a crime of violence, however most youth are committed using written findings.

Top four offenses in FY25: Simple Assault, Aggravated Assault, Grand Theft, Possession of a Stolen Motor Vehicle

# Improving Outcomes for our Youth & Families

- DOC Strategic Planning focuses on increasing interventions/access to parenting programs, services for youth in the community.
  - Thinking for Change groups in-person Sioux Falls & Rapid City field offices, tele-health for all youth (64% of all JCA staff are trained facilitators). Completion rates were 69% in first year.
  - Strengthening Families-second year of funding through DOC Title II formula grant program. LSS providing this in Sioux Falls and now Rapid City to any family.
  - **EPICS/CAREY Guides**-JCA staff have increased utilization of these tools to support positive behavior change-detailed overview in 2024 Statistical Report.
  - Dialectical Behavior Therapy-JCA staff trained in DBT skills, integrated into current practice to assist youth with emotional regulation and better decision making.


## Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act

· Focused on out of school youth. GED support, post-secondary education funding.

#### **Eligible Youth**

- 18-24 years-old- asked to reconsider given new compulsory school age is 17 years.
- Adolescents that are out-of-school and or not affiliated with a high school or registered for post-secondary classes.
  - a. This program can assist individuals in career exploration, work-based learning, and financial support.
  - b. DLR can provide tuition assistance for the following DLR approved post-secondary programs.(<a href="https://dlr.sd.gov/workforce\_services/individuals/training\_opportunities/approved\_programs.aspx#list">https://dlr.sd.gov/workforce\_services/individuals/training\_opportunities/approved\_programs.aspx#list</a>)
  - c. Provides the individual with work-based learning which allows for participants to gain skills and work references. During this time an individual will work with a participating business and DLR will pay that individuals wages.
  - d. Individuals can also enter a job where DLR will reimburse up to 50% of the employee's wage. Training, wages, and benefits are provided by the employer.

### **Juvenile Diversion Payments**

• DOC provides a fiscal incentive of up to \$750 for each juvenile that successfully completes a diversion program.

• \$4.2M paid to counties since the inception of the program in FY16= nearly 15,000 young people successfully diverted.

• FY25 data currently being submitted by counties. Will include details in FY 25 JJPSIA annual report.
