CALL TO ORDER: Chairman Hutmacher called the meeting to order at 11:05 a.m. Central time.

Julie Smith conducted a roll call of members present. A quorum was present.

Chairman Hutmacher welcomed Legislative Oversight Committee Member, Representative Mary Duvall.

Chairman Hutmacher announced that the meeting was streaming live on SD.net, a service of South Dakota Public Broadcasting.

ANNUAL ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Mr. Freeman recommended retaining the same officers with Jim Hutmacher, Chairman, Tim Bjork, Vice Chairman and Leo Holzbauer as Secretary.

Motion by Mr. Freeman, second by Mr. Bjork, to nominate Jim Hutmacher, Chairman, Tim Bjork, Vice Chairman and Leo Holzbauer as Secretary for the upcoming year. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

Motion by Mr. Hoyt, second by Mr. Bjork, to have Mr. Freeman be appointed prehearing officer for prehearing matters such as motions. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

ADOPT FINAL AGENDA:

Motion by Mr. Bjork, second by Ms. Dixon, to adopt the final agenda. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

CONFLICTS DISCLOSURES AND REQUEST FOR STATE BOARD WAIVERS: None

APPROVAL OF BOARD MINUTES FOR MAY 8, 2019:

Mr. Freeman proposes to amend the paragraph on page 17 of the minutes regarding Chairman Hutmacher's reasoning for not allowing participation by conference call as follows:

Chairman Hutmacher indicated parties will need to be present and participation by conference call will not be allowed at future meetings involving the TransCanada, Wink Cattle Company and Tom and Lori Wilson water permit applications. This is due to the fact it is very difficult for the court reporter to identify witnesses and accurately transcribe the testimony. Technical issues with phone connections make it almost impossible for the court reporter and Board members to understand the testimony presented.

Motion by Mr. Freeman, second by Mr. Bjork to amend the May 8, 2019 minutes. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

Motion by Mr. Bjork, second by Ms. Dixon to approve the minutes as amended. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

STATUS AND REVIEW OF WATER RIGHTS LITIGATION:

Ms. Mines Bailey stated the Board conducted a contested case hearing in 2013 regarding establishing the Lake Thompson outlet elevation. Due to high water levels causing flooding this year, DENR has received inquiries regarding the outlet elevation. The Board retained jurisdiction regarding the outlet elevation to address any changes to the outlet elevation, if requested. It is possible that the Board may receive such a request including that a special meeting be scheduled to consider the matter.

ADMINISTER OATH TO DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES STAFF: Carla Bachand, the court reporter, administered the oath to the DENR employees who intended to testify.

DENR WATER QUALITY MONITORING ACCESS PORTAL DEMONSTRATION:

Jesse Wilkens from the Watershed Protection program demonstrated the use and function of the Water Quality Monitoring Access Portal.

The online map shares water quality data from DENR's internal database and fish flesh contaminant data from DENR's fish flesh database, and also provides information from the South Dakota Integrated Report for Surface Water Quality Assessment and links to water quality documents such as TMDLs and other water quality related documents.

The various functions of the web application were demonstrated, and an explanation of how water quality advocacy groups are using the map to share their water quality data was provided.

Chairman Hutmacher asked Mr. Wilkens if the water samples were all taken at the surface or below the surface at some depth. Mr. Wilkens stated when looking at lakes, it's based on how clear the water is. Mr. Wilkens measure how clear the water is and then collects water to two times that depth.

Chairman Hutmacher asked Mr. Wilkens if he has involvement with the Zebra Mussel infestation that is coming. Mr. Wilkens stated that doesn't fall under DENR's jurisdiction. However, the Watershed Protection Program does keep an eye out for invasive species when in the field. When sampling, staff may go to five lakes in a day. DENR does follow strict protocol regarding cleaning the boat and equipment each time they move to another lake.

Chairman Hutmacher asked Mr. Wilkens if DENR tracks how many hits they have from the public looking at the website. Mr. Wilkens stated they don't, but would like to see that number. Water quality organizations, watershed improvement projects and related businesses are starting to use the website. Friends of the Big Sioux River have also been using the web site, collecting and looking at the data.

CANCELLATION CONSIDERATION: A table listing the water rights/permits proposed for cancellation, the notices of cancellation, and the chief engineer’s recommendations were included in the packet the board members received prior to the meeting.

Mr. Gronlund stated eight water permit/rights are scheduled for cancellation.

Mr. Gronlund explained that there is one water right in division 1, two in division 2, and the remaining five are in division 3. In the column of the table entitled reason, the NC stands for Non-Construction. As the Board is aware when someone gets a new water right they have five years to complete construction. Administrative rule states if not constructed, the permit becomes invalid and therefore subject to cancellation.

Six of the water permits on the list are due to non-construction. The basis for cancellation of the other two is abandonment and/or forfeiture.

In the case of Water Right No. 4102-3, Mark and Sheila Muellenberg, that water right has not been used since the 1990’s. The Water Rights Program contacted and informed them that the water right permit is subject to cancellation since they have not irrigated.

Mr. Gronlund stated Water Right No. 4973-3 is subject to cancellation for abandonment because the owners indicated they sold the equipment and do not intend to irrigate again.

Water Rights Program did not receive any letters in response the notice of cancellations. The recommendation is for the Board proceed with cancellation.

Motion by Mr. Freeman, second by Mr. Bjork, to Cancel the Division 1, 2 and 3 water rights/permits as listed on the table for the reason set forth. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

FUTURE USE PERMITS SEVEN YEAR REVIEW:

Mr. Gronlund explained that future use permits are subject to a seven year review by the Water Management Board to determine if there remains a reasonable need for the future use permit.

Mr. Gronlund explained that the board packet included a table of unopposed water permits issued based on the Chief Engineer's recommendation. At the bottom of that table is a separate table showing the future use permits subject to review today. There are six future use permits scheduled for their seven year review today as set forth in the table. For each future use permit, the packet has a the letter received from the future use permit holder requesting to retain the permit, Chief Engineer's recommendation and affidavits of publication.

At the time of mailing the Water Rights Program had not received two affidavits. One was for TM Rural Water from the Miner County Pioneer and the other was from the Huron Plainsman in the matter of the City of De Smet's future use permit. Since the Board packet was mailed, those affidavits have been received and are on file.

Mr. Gronlund stated in response of the public notice, no petitions to intervene were received by the date listed which was July 5. The Water Rights Program did receive an email yesterday that included four letters in support of the city of DeSmet's future use permit remaining in effect. Those letters are part of the file and considered late file petitions.

The recommendation of the Water Rights Program is for the future use permits to remain in effect as set forth in the table that is included in the board packet. Future Use Permit No. 1407-2 held by the city of Custer reserves 434 acre feet from Precambrian Rock; Nos. 135-3 and 5003-3 held by the city of Pierre which combined reserves 3,374 acre feet from the Missouri: Pierre aquifer; No. 524-3 for city of DeSmet reserves 625 acre feet from the Vermillion East Fork Aquifer; No. 558A-3 held by the city of Castlewood reserving 123 acre feet from the Big Sioux Aquifer; and No. 5358-3 held by TM Rural Water System reserving 530 acre feet from the Upper Vermillion Missouri Aquifer.

Motion by Mr. Freeman, second by Ms. Dixon, for the future use permit as set forth in the table remain in effect as per the recommendations of the Chief Engineer. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

CONSIDER DELETION OF QUALIFICATION TO PERMIT NO. 1358B-3, WIPF ACRES:

Mr. Gronlund stated that the Board Packet included a notice scheduling today's hearing and letters from Gary Wipf, with Wipf Acres LLC and Lenny Peterson requesting deletion of qualification No. 5 on Water Permit No. 1358B-3.

Water Permit No. 1358B-3 issued in February 2019, allowed the transfer of the well, diversion rate authority and irrigated acres authorized by Water Right No. 1358-3 to a new location. The permit authorized the transfer of 1.78 cfs and 135 acres from the SW ¼ Section 17-T115N-R61W to the NE ¼ Section 12-T115N-R62W.

Water Permit No. 1358B-3 when approved included qualification No. 5 that required plugging of the original well in the SW ¼ Section 17-T115N-R61W. Since the time No. 1358B-3 was approved, Wipf Acres sold the land in the SW ¼ Section 17-T115N-R61W to Lenny Peterson. Mr. Peterson wants to keep the well for livestock watering. The Water Rights Program recommends deletion of qualification No. 5 regarding the plugging requirement. Mr. Gronlund stated that if that board deletes qualification No. 5, the Water Rights Program will reissue the water permit without qualification No. 5.

Mr. Freeman stated he is recusing himself from this matter since he represents one of the parties in other pending matters.

Mr. Hoyt asked Mr. Gronlund if a permit is necessary for Mr. Peterson use for livestock water. Mr. Gronlund indicated that watering of free range livestock is a domestic use that does not require a water permit. Mr. Hoyt asked how the volume taken from the well will be measured. Mr. Gronlund said generally water diverted from a source for livestock watering is not a significant amount and is not required to be measured.

Ms. Dixon asks how DENR prevents abuse of the use of water. Mr. Gronlund stated the foundation statutes in codified law chapter 46-1 does not allow for the waste or unreasonable use of water. If the pumping of water resulted in a waste of water that is something the Water Rights can regulate. Mr. Gronlund stated for Water Rights to investigate whether a waste of water is taking place would likely be complaint driven.

Motion by Mr. Bjork, second by Ms. Dixon, to delete the qualification No. 5 on Water Permit No.1358B-3 as recommended by DENR. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

CONSIDER RESCISSION OF SUSPENSION FOR FAILURE TO REPORT 2018 IRRIGATION QUESTIONNAIRE:

Water Right Nos. 2547-3, 2548-3 and 3085-3 – Gene De Vries Inc.
Water Right Nos. 6381-3 and 6440-3 – De Vries Inc.

Mr. Gronlund stated that the Board packet included the report prepared by Genny McMath with the past reporting history and a letter from Jeff De Vries regarding why the irrigation questionnaires were not timely filed. The irrigation questionnaires for these five water rights were filed July 8, 2019.

Mr. Gronlund stated that the five water rights, combined, appropriate a total 8.58 cfs which is about 3,850 gallons per minute. The irrigation systems are located southeast of Huron.

Mr. Gronlund stated these five water rights were suspended by the Board at the March meeting for failure to submit the 2018 irrigation questionnaire. The suspension took effect 30 days after the water right holder was provided notice of the Board's action. Mr. De Vries' letter explained that his father had health issues that resulted in the mail getting rerouted and his sister was the one who got the notice. She did not recognize that it was required to respond back to the questionnaire.

Mr. De Vries was administered the oath by the court reporter. Mr. De Vries stated his dad had health issues in October. While his dad was doctoring the mail had gotten rerouted. Mr. De Vries said that the first permit was obtained in 1976 and this is the first time they had ever missed. Mr. De Vries requested the board to reconsider suspension of their water rights.

Motion by Mr. Hoyt, second by Mr. Bjork, that the Board rescind the suspension for failure to report on the 2018 irrigation questionnaires for Water Right Nos. 2547-3, 2548-3 and 3085-3, 6381-3, 6440-3 based on the explanation provided by Mr. De Vries. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

UNOPPOSED NEW WATER PERMITS ISSUED BY THE CHIEF ENGINEER WITHOUT A HEARING BEFORE THE BOARD:

Prior to the meeting the board received a copy of the table listing the unopposed new water permits issued by the chief engineer (see attachment at the end of the minutes).

David McVey stated the motions that Prehearing Officer Rodney Freeman has considered and issued orders for denial as follows:

- TransCanada motion to dismiss intervenors
- Elizabeth Lone Eagle motions to disqualify DENR reports and recommendations and for immediate denial of applications
- TransCanada motion to dismiss petition of the Great Plains Tribal Water Alliance
- TransCanada motion to preclude consideration of implied water rights
- TransCanada motion to preclude evidence about the merits of the Keystone pipeline
- TransCanada motion to preclude consideration of tribal land issues and treaty rights
- Tom and Lori Wilson motion to dismiss petition in intervention
- Tom and Lori Wilson motion to preclude consideration of implied water rights
- Tom and Lori Wilson motion in limine to preclude evidence regarding the merits of the Keystone pipeline
- Wink Cattle Company motion to dismiss petitions in intervention
- Wink Cattle Company motion to preclude consideration of implied water rights

Motion by Mr. Hoyt, second by Mr. Bjork to approve and adopt orders issued by the Prehearing Officer as stated by the board counsel. Motion carried unanimously by roll call vote.

Chairman Hutmacher indicated his intent is to conduct the hearings by initially holding two days of hearings, then take a break, followed by an additional three days for hearings. It is his intent to have the evidentiary hearing completed in October so that findings can be considered at the December meeting and the matter completed prior to the holiday season.

Chairman Hutmacher initially chose the date of Friday, August 16th as the deadline for intervenors and parties to disclose names and contact information for witnesses and the date parties and intervenors must provide a list of all exhibits.

Mr. Bruce Ellison on behalf of Dakota Rural Action indicated he may need more time to get answers to their interrogatories compelled. Those answers may effect who is called as a witness or the exhibits intended for the hearing. Mr. Ellison wants an additional month for discovery.

After discussion among parties, Chairman Hutmacher stated disclosure of names and contact information for witnesses and the date for providing a list of all exhibits will be Friday, August 30, 2019.

Ann Mines Bailey asked Chairman Hutmacher if he intended just a list of exhibits to be provided or actually exchange of exhibits. Chairman Hutmacher stated that would be the date for both the list of exhibits and exchange of exhibits among parties.

Ms. Mines Bailey stated the administrative record is commonly admitted as an exhibit into the record. The administrative record for the three TransCanada applications, Tom and Lori Wilson application and Wink Cattle Company's application are quite large. The Water Rights Program is trying to put everything up online so all the parties can access the record. The record will be available to all parties here in Pierre if they want to come in and physically go through the documents. Ms. Mines Bailey requested that the administrative record be excluded from needing to be provided to parties.

Chairman Hutmacher asked Mr. Ellison if he has an objection to the administrative record being excluded from needing to be exchanged with parties. Mr. Ellison stated no objection as long as the administrative record will be available at the time of hearing.

Chairman Hutmacher granted exclusion of the administrative record needing to be exchanged among parties.

After considerable discussion among parties, Chairman Hutmacher set the hearing dates for consideration of the three TransCanada applications, Tom and Lori Wilson application and Wink Cattle Company application for October 3-4, 2019, and October 29-31, 2019.

Mr. Hutmacher asked David McVey to explain how the Board should except to proceed.

David McVey explained under Codified Law 46-2A9 the four factors that need to be met in order to issue a permit. The first two criteria is whether there is a reasonable probability that unappropriated water is available and if the proposed use can be developed without unlawful impairment of existing rights. Testimony for the applications regarding these criteria will need to specific to each individual application. The third and fourth criteria are public interest and beneficial use. The testimony regarding public interest and beneficial use may be more unified testimony. Mr. McVey did indicate the Wink Cattle Company and Tom and Lori Wilson applications are amendments to existing permits which to an extent limits the review.

Mr. McVey stated that prior to the hearing a directive scheduling order will be issued on how the hearing will proceed.

Chairman Hutmacher stated the Board will send parties a directive schedule order on how the hearing will be conducted in advance of the meeting. If motions or other things are filed, they will go before the Prehearing Officer who will rule on them in a timely manner.

Bill Taylor stated after October 31, 2019, there will be Findings and Facts, Conclusions of Law and a Final Decision drafted for consideration and adoption by the Board. It would be their intent to bring those findings to the Board for adoption in time for the December meeting. So the Board may have to shorten up the time lines for objections to the proposed findings and/or submission of alternative findings.

Ann Mines Bailey indicated the rule states proposal for findings shall be mailed not less than 20 days before the next regularly scheduled Board meeting.

Bruce Ellison questioned should a party need to seek an argument prior to the evidentiary hearing whether it is proper procedure to bring the matter before the prehearing officer? Chairman Hutmacher indicated that is correct.

Peter Capossela stated he would like time in between the filing of expert reports and the deadlines for submission of exhibits in the event that there is written information submitted that warrants an additional exhibit in response to an expert report. For instance, TransCanada has indicated that they have an expert that runs a computer model for the yield from watersheds.

Chairman Hutmacher stated a party can file an extension for submittal of exhibits with the prehearing officer.

Chairman Hutmacher stated that participation by intervenors will not be allowed by telephone conference call. This is due to difficulties for the Board to hear what is being said and the court reporter is unable to understand and transcribe an accurate record of testimony.
