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Minutes:

I. Call to Order / Welcome and Introductions

November 17, 2021 the Behavioral Health Advisory Council meeting was called to order by Melanie Boetel, representing Jane Grant. Jennifer Humphrey took attendance.

II. Review and Approval of Meeting Minutes

The Advisory Council reviewed the August 2021 meeting minutes. Angle Dammer moved to approve. Eric Weiss seconded the motion. Motion carried, all approved.

III. Membership

Expiring Terms – 10/30/21

Jennifer Humphrey announced that additional nominations for the position representing a

prevention provider were submitted to Governor Noem for her consideration. Nominations and reappointments are anticipated prior to the 2022 Legislative Session.

IV. Election of Vice-Chair

Karen Severns and Angie Dammer were nominated for the role of Vice-Chair. Under an anonymous Survey Monkey poll, Angie Dammer was elected for the position.

V. Human Services Center (HSC) Update No updates.

VI. Fiscal Year 2021 Data Outcome Presentation

Tiffany Glaser, Assistant Director to the Office of Performance Management Outcomes, presented on the Division of Behavioral Health's statistical and outcome data for Fiscal Year 2021.

VII. Division of Behavioral Health Update

Fiscal Reports

Jennifer Humphrey provided an overview of the FY 2022 Quarter 1 expenditures in the areas of substance use and mental health services.

2022-2023 State Plan

Jennifer Humphrey announced that the 2022-2023 State Plan was submitted September 1st to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration and is currently under review.

Block Grant Supplemental Funds

Melanie Boetel announced the creation of grant briefs for the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act and the American Rescue Plan Act supplemental funding for the Substance Abuse, Prevention and Treatment and Mental Health Block Grants. Behavioral Health Voucher Program (BHVP)

Melanie Boetel presented an update to adults and youth served through the BHVP, including the location of contracted providers throughout the state. Slides are attached to the meeting minutes.

In addition, the Division is working with the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources in coordinating the BHVP for farmers through a grant they received.

988 Planning Grant

Jennifer Humphrey announced the 988 stakeholder coalition met September 20th to review the drafted 988 implementation plan. The draft plan was submitted to the Vibrant Emotional Health project officer and feedback is pending but anticipated by the end of November.

The coalition also met November 16th. The intent of the meeting was to discuss Vibrant's feedback on the draft plan. Unable to do this, various updates were provided with the primary focus being on the three strategies – someone to call, someone to respond and somewhere to go. The next meeting will take place in January.

VIII. Office of Prevention Services Update

Mental Health Awareness Training (MHAT) Grant

Melanie Boetel announced the Division's award of the MHAT Grant. The purpose of the grant is to prepare and train others on how to respond to persons with a mental disorder appropriately and safely, providing education and linkages to appropriate community resources. The award is \$125,000 per year for the next five years beginning September 30, 2021 through September 29, 2026.

Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT)

Melanie Boetel announced a no cost extension was awarded with a funding end date of September 30, 2022. The final grant year will focus on new integration of screenings into emergency departments and longevity planning for sustainable SBIRT integration into South Dakota medical facilities through mini-grants. Mini-grants will be targeted for education and implementation opportunities that will assure sustainable SBIRT screening and intervention practices beyond the grant funding period. Brown Clinic and Avera will continue screening through May 31, 2022. Sage will continue to serve as project director. For more information, visit: https://dss.sd.gov/behavioralhealth/grantinfo.aspx.

National Strategy for Suicide Prevention (NSSP) Grant.

Melanie Boetel announced that the NSSP is beginning its second year and the Division will be requesting a carryover of funding from year one. The grant supports the Adult Follow-up Program with the Helpline and inpatient psychiatric units. Since the beginning of the program through October 31, 2021, 691 adults have been enrolled and 16 adults reported being actively engaged in mental health services in October.

Other areas supported include suicide prevention and mental health promotion trainings such as Mental Health First Aid, Question, Persuade Refer, and ASIST (Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training). Through October 31, 2021, the Division has approved 47 suicide prevention and mental health awareness trainings with an additional 1 request pending approval and 5 canceled. In addition, the Division funded 24 completed trainings with 297 individuals while streamlining coordination for all suicide prevention trainings. Lastly, the Division is working with the Education Development Center related to suicide

prevention needs throughout the statement and enhancement of Zero Suicide.

Youth Suicide Prevention

Melanie Boetel announced that efforts continue with the Youth Follow-up Program. Since the beginning of the program in Fiscal Year 2017 through October 31, 2021, 2,069 youth have been enrolled.

State Opioid Response (SOR) Grant

Melanie Boetel announced that a carryover request is due December 28, 2021 to carry over year one funds of the SOR II Grant. The next round of SOR funding was announced with an estimated post date of February 15, 2022.

Standing Order – Naloxone

Melanie Boetel announced that during quarter 3 (July – September), there were 6 Naloxone kits dispensed through pharmacies participating in the statewide standing order. There are currently 46 pharmacies enrolled to participate in the standing order. There have been 37 individuals that have enrolled in the free online overdose education/naloxone training, and 29 of those have successfully completed the full training. The Division continues to raise awareness of naloxone availability through the Avoid Opioid

campaign.

Oxford House

Melanie Boetel announced the opening of a men's house with 9 beds in Rapid City on October 1, 2021. There are currently 7 houses with 65 beds total.

Early Intervention Prevention Programming

Melanie Boetel discussed various opportunities for free evidence-based trainings and materials. The first training is scheduled November 23, 2021 through the Change Companies, and it is a live, interactive training using web conferencing technology that includes a brief but comprehensive "how-to" for implementing Interactive Journaling, Alternatives and What About Marijuana. There are currently 29 individuals signed up for the training.

IX. Open Discussion/Council Member Updates

Teresa Rowland announced the Department of Education's newly published School-Based Mental Health Providers in South Dakota:

It provides an overview of each profession as well as how they fit within a multi-tiered system of support to ensure students receive the necessary services to develop an ability to cope with life's challenges so they may learn, thrive, and grow.







