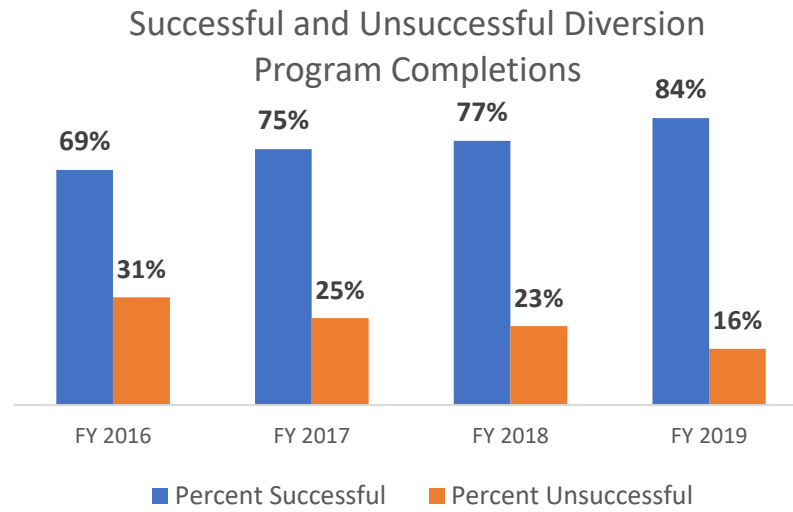
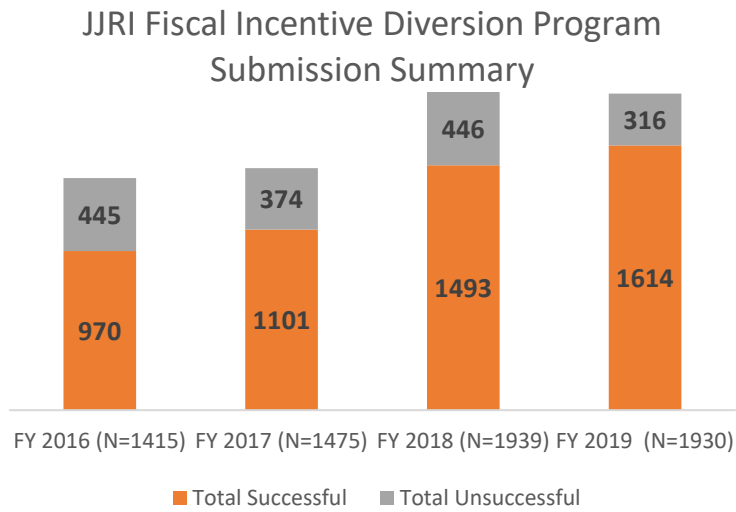

### Key Takeaways

There was a wide variation in length of detention stays across the state.

The Second Circuit had the highest number of detention stays. The First Circuit had the highest number of repeat stays.

26 youth had more than one stay in detention. 16 youth had 2 stays, 8 youth had 3 stays, and 2 youth had 4 or more stays.
