Dear Members of the SD Council of Developmental Disabilities:

State agencies and private partners have supported the development and print of South Dakota specific materials to support the healthy development of all children 0-5 and aid in the identification of developmental delays and disabilities so children receive early intervention services as soon as possible.

Books for 1, 2 and 3 year old children support parents in understanding typical developmental milestones in a fun and engaging way while supporting parent/child interaction and early language and literacy skills. These books, along with many other materials, are available in English and Spanish. All customized for our state with referral information to support parents to "Act Early" when developmental concerns arise and seek developmental screenings.

The SD Act Early materials are ordered across systems statewide to ensure a consistent and coordinated message on the importance of supporting healthy child development with readily available materials. Birth to Three, Early Childhood, Head Start, Child Care, medical providers and many more order these valuable resources. The supply of SD Act Early materials is adequate to meet demand, with the exception of Baby's Busy Day board books in English. The supply of Baby's Busy Day books has been deleted with 600 currently on backorder. 3,069 Baby's Busy Day English were distributed in 2023; 2,261 were distributed in 2024; 444 were distributed in 2025 before the supply was exhausted. SDCDD has been a generous supporter of the SD Act Early materials with print sponsorships in 2024, 2023, and 2022.

Thanks to funding from the Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems (ECCS) grant we will be able to print 1,540 Baby's Busy Day books. A sponsorship from SD Council on Developmental Disabilities will allow additional board books to be printed to meet the demand. The Council logo can be added to the books in recognition of the sponsorship.

A sponsorship of \$3,000 is requested to support print and distribution of additional Baby's Busy Day board books for caregivers of young children.

#### Other information that Lisa shared for Consideration:

Over 40,000 customized SD Act Early materials were distributed statewide in 2023 through 81 systems/providers in 37 communities.

We recently concluded a 2024 Survey of awareness and use of the SD AE materials and impacts. We are pleased to report that 64% of respondents were aware/very aware of the materials (an increase from 47% in 2022), 81% of systems report distributing materials to caregivers/families (an increase from 66% in 2022), 53% report increased staff and caregiver/family knowledge of community supports when developmental concerns arise, 43% report increased referrals to screening resources (an increase from 29% in 2022) and 36% report increased developmental screenings (an increase from 24% in 2022).

76 respondents in 2024 with varied response numbers to individual questions.

○ Select 2024 vs 2022 respondent results below....

- Birth to Three is again cited as leading referral source for SD AE materials
- 64% of respondents were aware/very aware of the SD AE materials, an increase from 47% in 2022
- 81% of systems report distributing materials to caregivers/families, an increase from 66% in 2022
- 73% report using MM booklets versus 52% in 2022
- 71% report using developmental checklists vs 54% in 2022
- 46% report using Tip Sheets (How to Get Help for your Child, How to Talk with Parents about Concerns, Professional Primers) vs. 33% in 2022
- 34% report using materials in Spanish vs 17% in 2022

■ 96% of respondents indicated their program was engaged in recognizing developmental milestones vs 72% in 2022

- 65% report increased staff knowledge of developmental milestones vs 56% in 2022
- 42% report increased staff monitoring of developmental milestones vs 31%in 2022
- 47% report increased caregiver/family monitoring of developmental milestones
- 55% report increased staff collaboration around supporting a child's development vs 48% in 2022

■ 51% report increased caregiver/family and staff collaboration around supporting a child's development

■ 53% report both increased staff and caregiver/family knowledge of community supports when developmental concerns arise

- 43% report increased referrals to screening resources, an increase from 29% in 2022
- 36% report increased developmental screenings, an increase from 24% in 2022

Comment: We had a mom that was trying to receive help from the local school. Due to the child being younger they could not assist her. She stopped in our library and we shared the SD AE information we received at Library Institute. She is now meeting with other agencies at the library, the speech gal meets with her every Wednesday.

Respondents indicate 89% serve low-income populations, 78% serve rural/frontier (increase from 66% in 2022), 78% serve those with disabilities (an increase from 64% in 2022), 78% serve American Indian populations (an increase from 61% in 2022), 65% serve Black/African American populations (an increase from 55% in 2022), 48% serve homeless populations (an increase from 36% in 2022).

# If we chose to fund the request of \$3,000 the total project impact from other donations would be:

With the additional funds from DDCouncil (\$2250), SDAFP (\$750), DSS Child Protection (\$2000) and the funding from ECCS grant, we can increase our print volume to **3,520 from 1,540.** All books will have the DDC logo as well as DSS, SDAFP, ECCS (that includes the ECCS logo, USD Health Sciences logo, and Center for Prevention of Child Maltreatment logo) on the back of each book. DDC will also be recognized in a funding statement on the inside back cover as well as our other sponsors.
