Adult Education and Family Literacy Act—Title II of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act



The Workforce Development Council will review the WIOA Title II applications to determine whether those proposals are consistent with the Unified State Plan; the Council shall also make recommendations to DLR to promote alignment with the Unified State Plan.

Adult Education means academic instruction and education services below the postsecondary level that increase an individual's ability to read, write, and speak in English and perform mathematics or other activities necessary for the attainment of a secondary school diploma or its recognized equivalent; transition to postsecondary education and training; and obtain employment.

Literacy means an individual's ability to read, write, and speak in English, compute, and solve problems, at levels of proficiency necessary to function on the job, family, and society.

Workplace Adult Education and Literacy Activities means adult education and literacy activities offered by an eligible provider in collaboration with an employer or employee organization at a workplace or an off-site location that is designed to improve the productivity of the workforce.

Family Literacy means activities of sufficient intensity and duration to make sustainable improvements in the economic prospects for a family, enabling parents or family members to support their children's learning needs [by integrating Adult Education and Literacy, interactive activities between parents and children, parental training, and age-appropriate education for children to succeed].

English Language Acquisition Program means a program of instruction designed to help eligible individuals who are English language learners achieve competence in reading, writing, speaking, and comprehension of the English language; and that leads to attainment of a high school equivalency, and transition to postsecondary education and training, or employment.

Integrated English Literacy and Civics Education means services that enable adults to achieve competency in the English language and acquire the skills needed to function effectively as parents, workers, and citizens in the United States. Such services shall include instruction in literacy and English language acquisition and instruction on the rights and responsibilities of citizenship and civic participation, and may include workforce training.

Workforce Preparation means activities designed to help an individual acquire a combination of basic academic skills, critical thinking skills, digital literacy skills, and self-management skills, and obtaining skills necessary for successful transition into and completion of postsecondary education or training, or employment.

Integrated Education and Training means a service approach that provides adult education and literacy activities concurrently and contextually with workforce preparation activities and workforce training for a specific occupation or occupational cluster for the purpose of educational and career advancement.
